



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

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HPNA General Meeting Minutes: Sept. 11, 2023

HPNA President Kevin Heyburn called the meeting to order at 7:05 pm.

Kevin described the docent role for the Homes Tour and asked anyone interested in volunteering to sign up. He reminded everyone that volunteers get free tickets to the Homes Tour, which will be on November 12, 2023.

Kevin announced that tonight Zohaib "Zo" Qadri is here. He was elected to the City Council in 2022 and represents our neighborhood along with the rest of District 9, including downtown, Rainey Street, West Campus, Mueller, and Cherrywood. Zo believes everyone deserves a voice and access to opportunities. Zo moved to Texas when he was 12 years of age. He received his master's degree from Texas State University and a second master's degree in global affairs from Rice University. He has taken on multiple projects such as advising advocacy groups and building alliances. He ran a progressive political campaign. He lives in downtown Austin with his wife, Wafa, a physician assistant, and their cat.

Zo introduced himself, telling us that he moved to Austin in 2009 and for one year he was a resident of Hyde Park. He lived in an apartment complex while in school. Zo then walked through a handout he brought with his staff contact information. Anna, who just joined his staff about a month ago, also attended the meeting. The handout with contact information will be posted on the HPNA website.

Zo mentioned that updates on the Council's activity and his initiatives are available on social media. He publishes a newsletter every two weeks. Currently there are over 1,200 people signed up to receive it. Zo holds office hours every Friday from 10 am to 12 pm at City Hall or an area coffee shop and monthly Taco Tuesday meetings. He will be holding a bigger Town Hall meeting with Mayor Watson and other civic leaders that will be announced soon on social media.

Zo talked about recent Council business. There was an initiative to establish a marker in honor of LGBTQ+ neighbors and they addressed a loophole in code that allowed windowless apartment buildings in the West Campus area.

He talked about a gentleman who went missing on Rainey Street and was later found deceased. In response to this and other incidents, the Council brought forward the Safe Rainey Street initiative, with better lighting and more patrols, and is working on installing more cameras. One person has already been rescued since the initiative started.

Another huge issue is the I35 expansion. Zo is not a fan, but the plan is moving forward. He has had

A guest community member will be invited to lead a drop-in tour of Formosa through his or her unique point of view. The Ney's education staff will also be on hand to answer additional questions regarding Elisabet Ney's studio practices. Curated food and drink pairings will be provided.

• Re-Imagining the Ney: A Night in the Landscape, Thursday, October 12, 2023, 6:30 to 8:30 pm

Explore Elisabet Ney's rugged but majestic limestone homestead and art studio, Formosa, and unique 2.5 acre landscape through a variety of hands-on horticulture activities and demonstrations. Attendees will learn about the museum's surrounding native landscape restored to a 19th century Austin through specialized evening walks. Come watch the sunset with landscape architects and local ecologists as

we discuss Ney's unique landscape and historical significance to Austin.

• Re-Imagining the Ney: A Community Art Bash, Saturday, October 21, 2023, 3:00 to 8:00 pm

Reimagine Elisabet Ney's iconoclastic life and brilliant art through the lens of contemporary artists creating site-specific art experiences in the Museum and across the entire

experiences in the Museum and across the entire historic grounds. Attendees will experience artist interventions, theatrical performances, and musical expressions immersed throughout the Museum's expansive grounds, paired with curated food and drinks from local vendors and specialized museum tours crafted by interpretive actors. Come celebrate the museum's evolving programs and exhibits and share your thoughts on the next evolution of the Museum. As the evening approaches, the event will transition into an after-hours event, featuring interac-

several meetings with TXDOT to get the nicest looking "ugly plan" they can get.

Kevin Heyburn read questions submitted by neighbors, as follows:

Infrastructure and Management

 With the new construction on I35, how can we keep Duval Street and Red River Street from being the by-pass for traffic? Now when something happens on I35, the traffic greatly increases on Duval and Red River.

Zo responded that neighborhoods will be greatly impacted by the 10-year construction project. He thinks it is important to have conversations about it and encourages people to reach out to representatives at the state and federal level. He acknowledges there will be a problem and that

right now there is a lot of uncertainty.

– Developers, cable and fiber commercial businesses, and so forth often damage and tear up streets during construction. How can the city make sure the streets and curbs are restored to their original state and thus prevent damage to cars and other vehicles using the streets?

Zo suggested that for these issues, call 311, reach out to his staff directly, and cc him.

— What can the city do to better address graffiti tagging across the city, including here in Hyde Park?


Zo stated that there is someone from the Downtown Commission who deals with it. He said that more enforcement is needed.

 Rampant speeding, street racing, and occasional street takeovers seem to be met with almost no active APD traffic enforcement. What else can the city do better to address this, particularly in

Hyde Park High Street Project

The Hyde Park High Street Project group proposes $oldsymbol{1}$ to construct a new commercial building replacing the Hyde Park Bar & Grill parking lot. The property was leased to Hyde Park Bar & Grill since 1994, but when the owners sold the property a couple of years ago local developers Jesse Lunsford and Ray Brimble purchased it. The new owners want to bring new businesses and opportunities to this important commercial hub in Hyde Park. The proposal will allow a restaurant of up to 2500 SF with an additional 1400 SF of retail or other services on the ground floor and up to 9100 SF of office space on the second floor, which will cover much of the parking below. Most of the 25' setback along Avenue H will be returned to green space and tree protection, allowing only five parking spaces where nine exist today. The new building is intended to align with the commercial building across the alley (Quack's) to extend the pedestrian-oriented businesses along the E. 43rd Street sidewalk. Preliminary plans include 30 parking spaces on site, no driveways on Avenue H, and the entrance to be alongside the current alley with access from E. 43rd Street. The resulting green space along Avenue H and adjacent to E. 43rd Street will include outdoor seating. Preliminary drawings that have been shown at HPNA meetings indicate the maximum building that can be constructed on the site under the requested zoning modifications. This has been presented to neighbors and the owners are available to continue the discussion. We hope that many neighbors will support the changes that are needed to fulfill this plan and bring new businesses to the Duval hub in Hyde Park.



neighborhoods like ours with long straightaways like Duval, Red River, and 45th Street?

Zo responded that more enforcement is needed for this as well. He talked about reengineering streets to discourage speeding, including more stop signs and stop lights. His hope is that the city can get back to the negotiating table with the police union to get a fair, equitable long-term contract. He believes all the emergency teams need to work together, including the firefighters, EMS, and police. He is not a fan of the DPS partnership and emphasized that the police contract is very important.

• Zoning, Preservation, Development, Housing

– Do you support historic preservation?

Zo replied that he does. He wants to consider equity. He mentioned the Westview Towers project and talked about preserving the character of the city. When asked what the criteria would be for making a building worth preserving, he replied that he would look at what it is taking money away from and if it is right for the greater community.

– What rules would you support in managing short-term rentals in neighborhoods?

Zo is not a huge fan of AirBnB type housing, but he doesn't have an answer for it yet. There are no hard rules yet.

– Now that the new housing density resolutions have been passed unanimously on consent, why has small lot disaggregation been pushed out to April 2024?

The short answer is capacity, and the backlog of resolutions.

— Does the City need to hire a third party consultant to assist city staff to eliminate the work backlog on the City Council's new housing resolutions?

Zo said there is currently no need for that. The Council is working closely with the City Manager and others during the budget process to address the backlog.

Do you support greater impervious cover to provide more housing even though a previous city council implemented more rigorous flood control due to greater flooding?

Zo said that with summers getting hotter and winters colder, we need to think about flooding prevention. He stated that more housing does not necessarily mean more impervious cover.

Lettuce Recycle! by Dena Houston



Questions and Answers Part

very week, I receive questions about recycling and composting. I always answer them personally and then try to include the question and answer in "Lettuce Recycle." If any reader has any recycling or composting concerns or comments, please send them to denahouston3309@gmail.com. I welcome all questions and often learn something new from each one.



Aluminum Foil Boxes: Do I need to take the metal cutting strip off my aluminum foil and similar type boxes? No, you do not. The paper mill recyclers have the equipment to remove this metal from the cardboard.

Bagging Recyclables: Can I put recyclables in a paper bag before I put them into the blue recycling cart? No, do not bag recyclables. Bagged recyclables will be sent to the landfill. There is not the manpower at the recycling center to empty these bags.

Balcones Resourses: Are the materials taken to Balcones Recycling facility really recycled or are they just thrown into the landfill? Balcones Resources is a for-profit company. It would not collect all this material just to throw it into the landfill. There are reliable markets for everything they collect.

Bottle Lids: Do I need to separate the lids from glass and plastic bottles? All glass jars need to have their lids removed. Keep all plastic lids on plastic bottles and containers. All lids smaller than a credit card need to go into the trash cart. All lids larger than a credit card should go into the blue cart.

Cardboard Boxes: Do I need to remove packing tape and staples from cardboard boxes before I put them into the blue cart? No, you do not. Tape and staples are fine to leave on the cardboard. Everything will be processed and baled at the recycling facility. At the secondary recycling paper mill, cardboard and paper go through a pulping process to remove any impurities.



Cardboard Waxed Containers: Can the cardboard waxed containers from juice and milk go into the green compost cart? No. These containers are made of mixed materials (wax, cardboard, and aluminum foil) and cannot be composted or recycled. They must go into your trash cart.

Cellophane: Do I have to remove the cellophane window in envelopes before I put them into the blue cart?

No, you do not. Even the plastic on top of Kleenex boxes can be left on. However, cellophane alone is not recyclable.

Glass: Is glass really recycled? Glass is one of the more difficult and more expensive items to recycle, but our recycling facilities have reliable markets for its glass.

Greeting Cards: Can greeting cards with batteries be recycled? The batteries need to be removed from the musical greeting cards and be recycled with batteries. Once the battery is out, the rest of the card can go into the recycling cart, providing it doesn't have any glitter, flocking, or other adornments on the card.

Keurig Cups: My keurig cup says "recyclable." Is it? No, the single-use coffee and tea pods are not recyclable in our market. The containers are too small to be collected for processing.

Labels: Do I need to remove the paper labels on the plastic bags that go into the plastic bag collection bins? Yes, these labels need to be removed.

Mailing Envelopes: How do I recycle the brown paper mailing envelopes with a bubble wrap lining? These are not recyclable because there are two layers of materials that cannot be separated. They can be reused or go into the trash cart. Bubble wrap by itself can be recycled in the plastic collection bins located at most grocery stores.

Please Remember:

- When in Doubt, Throw it Out! Recycling and composting contamination is a huge problem. If you have exhausted all reuse possibilities and are still unsure, put the item into the trash can.
- Nothing Smaller than a Credit Card in the Blue Bin.

Next Zo took questions from the audience.

- There was a question from Zoom about the new regulations and parking. Zo responded that this affects everyone including many non-traditional families and immigrants and is something the city needs to work on.
- Another question was about trash pickup and no room for trash cans on the street. Zo says a big issue is enforcement. He stated that any concern or frustration is valid. He is accessible and wants to hear about concerns. Zo mentioned House Bill 2127 that takes a lot of power away from the City Council, but it might be ruled unconstitutional.
- Karen McGraw pointed out all the work that the neighborhood has done on historic preservation and pressed to know more about Zo's intent in voting for the small lot resolution. Zo replied that there is still a lot of conversation and engagement needed and that he is not trying to ruin any neighborhood. He is just trying to make the city work for everyone. He doesn't have all the answers but wants the city to be livable for as many people as possible.
- There was another question about fewer parking restrictions and sidewalks. Zo said the city needs to do a better job on creating walkability. He himself was hit by a car in West Campus, so he understands.

Kevin thanked Zo and his staff for being at the meeting tonight. Zo had to leave at 7:45 to attend another meeting. He closed by saying that, if there are additional questions, please email his office. He wants to hear from everyone and for us all to work together.

Kevin would like to get feedback now or by email about Councilmember Zadri. Kevin stated that we hope to have him back.
