Egg Scramble Time

pring has sprung, and we all **I**know what that means: the Egg Scramble Bunny is on the prowl! Or should we say, on the hop? In either case, we know where he's headed - to our annual Hyde Park Egg Scramble at Shipe Park! 
Resting in Peace

 ${f I}$ t is not against the law in Texas to bury people on your property. This fact came to light recently during

the processing of an application for a construction permit on the vacant lot between 4205 and 4209 Avenue F.

During a routine check with the Historical Commission, it turned out that a number of historical personages are interred at this site. It also came to light that a minor Victorian masterpiece used to stand where the two houses at 4201 and 4205 Avenue F now stand.

The house belonged to Pierre Gaigneux, a native of Clermont-Ferrand, France, who emigrated to Austin in the mid-1880s with his sister Belle. Although not formally trained as an architect, polymath Gaigneux designed the house himself.

Pierre was seen as a young man of great promise when he arrived here. His friends and admirers spoke of his great intelligence, erudition, musical talent and charm. There was talk in political circles that he was destined for high office, perhaps even the governor's mansion.

As it turned out, he advanced no higher than assistant postmaster. This was widely attributed to his devotion to his sister who ran a "house" on W. 10th street. According to a handbill in the city archives, the establishment featured "the prettiest girls between the Sabine and the Rio Grande."

Between the years of 1889 and 1903, when Belle died of tuberculosis, her house was mentioned over a dozen times in the Austin American, almost always concerning incidents tinged with scandal.

In 1890, Josephine Baxter, one of the entertainers at Belle's establishment, was found dead in her room from an overdose of laudanum. A group of leading citizens demanded an inquiry, with the aim of shutting down the house. Belle's comment, quoted in the Austin American, was "Stuff happens." According to staff at the Austin History Center, this is

Shipe Pool and Shipe Park

ast month we received both good news and bad news about Shipe Pool. First, the bad news. It appears that Shipe Pool will not be opening this summer as originally planned. The pool was scheduled for major repair and redesign over a two year period, and the initial plan was to keep the pool open this summer and begin work on renovation in the fall after the season closes. However, due to unexpected problems discovered by the health department, including massive leaking and hazards associated with the pool drains, the city Parks and Recreation Department has determined that it is not possible to open the pool this summer without first doing expensive repairs. Those repairs would be short-term, because the whole pool will shortly be replaced with the new design, and the cost of those repairs represents a significant portion of the annual maintenance budget for the Aquatics department.

Additionally, the health department is also insisting that new fences be placed around the pools and that, in addition to lifeguards, a gate keeper be hired to staff the pool. We are unsure why these two requirements are just now being raised, given that there have been no changes in the underlying health code. We will continue to investigate these requirements and report back to the neighborhood as we learn more.

There is some good news about Shipe Pool. The latest pool design reduces the number of bathrooms to be built inside the pool fence. That will free up space around the pool deck and give swimmers a better view of the Ney Museum. As a replacement, some of the park money will be used to improve the

bathrooms in the log cabin outside the pool gate, which, we are told, will be available year round for patrons of Shipe Park. Perhaps HPNA and other neighborhood groups can partner with the City to restore the log cabin itself.

HPNA has always been a supporter of Shipe Park. Last month, there was another successful Its My Park! Day (IMPD), with neighbors and friends helping to clean and refurbish the park. We want to thank Mark Fishman, the HPNA Parks and Public Space Chair, for taking the lead on IMPD. We also want to thank the IMPD organizers: Lisa Harris, Alison Young, Adam Wilson, Leila Levinson, Summer Seibert, Jill Nokes, and Jack Nokes. Our thanks to Quack's for providing an amazing, free assortment of drinks and pastries. Even though the weather put a damper on a few things, such as painting and graffiti removal, everything else managed to get done, with about 100 folks participating in this annual event.

Ridgetop Elementary

Last month we received the great news that Ridgetop Elementary is no longer on the AISD list of schools to be closed. This news comes as a great relief for parents and children in North Hyde Park. Earlier in March, HPNA had passed a resolution in support of keeping the school open, and we received a lot of input from folks



in and outside of Hyde Park about how important Ridgetop is for children all over the city. We will continue to work with those residents to help provide the support

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Shipe Pool Update

On Monday, March 6, the Austin Parks and Recreation Department hosted a public forum at the Griffin School to provide an update on Shipe Pool. Construction drawings for the new pool will be finalized at the end of March, with the goal of breaking ground in October or November, 2017.

As part of the design and construction project, the bathrooms in the historic log cabin will be brought to current ADA standards to ensure that the pool meets the number of fixture required by City code. This innovative solution allows for more green space within the pool enclosure and gives park patrons access to upgraded, ADA-compliant facilities throughout the year. Unfortunately, the original budget did not include work outside the pool area. PARD has not identified funds to address the log cabin. At this time, any desired repair work will need to be funded by Friends of Shipe Park and HPNA. Pool project architects are looking at project requirements, but the total costs of the renovation have not yet been determined.

Park staff also presented several key site considerations, including forensic findings about the post oak tree west of the pool. After extensive core testing and analysis of the tree, representatives of the City Forestry Department and PARD forestry determined that the tree is dying and poses a public health hazard. PARD staff is open to the community to preserve wood from the tree to potentially construct park benches.

Austin Pilots Extended Outdoor Music Hours along Red River City Seeks Neighborhood Input

On May 1, the City of Austin will launch a six-month pilot of extended music hours in the Red River Cultural District, between 7th and 10th Streets.

During the pilot, outdoor live music curfews will be extended from 11 pm to midnight on Thursdays and from midnight to 1 am on Fridays and Saturdays for five local venues: the Empire Control Room and Garage, Cheer up Charlie's, the Mohawk, Sidewinder, and Stubbs BBQ.

The city will be collecting data to determine whether the extended hours benefit local venues and musicians and the impact of the pilot on homes, hotels, and businesses near the affected area. As part of this effort, the Economic Development Division will be placing sound monitors in potentially affected neighborhoods, including Hyde Park.

Alex Lopez, deputy director of the Economic Development Department for the City of Austin, has asked the HPNA for help locating sites where these monitors should be placed in our neighborhood. If you have suggestions, please contact HPNA Steering Committee Member, Joan Burnham, at <code>jgiburnham@gmail.com</code>. The City will also be setting up a special hotline for Red River Cultural District noise complaints. The number will be published in the May edition of the <code>Pecan Press</code> and distributed on the neighborhood Yahoo group.

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HPNA General Meeting Minutes: March 6, 2017

 ${
m R}$ eid Long, co-President, called the meeting to order at 7:06 pm.

Betsy Clubine provided the following updates: The City of Austin is piloting an extension of the hours during which outdoor live music can be presented in the Red River area (between 7th and 11th Street), extending the time from 11 pm to midnight during the week and until 1 am on weekends. This will begin in May. Monitoring devices will be set up in various neighborhoods, including Hyde Park, to see how the sound travels and whether it presents a problem. Any excessive noise resulting from the program should be reported to 311. The City's intent with this program is to determine if the extra hours provide a benefit for (often struggling) music venues and (always struggling) musicians. Hotels located downtown, particularly those serving the Convention Center, have opposed this program.

The reconstruction plans for Shipe Pool are moving forward. As the City will be able to count the existing bathrooms in the log cabin (in an upgraded form) against the current requirements, it will not need to build quite as much new bathroom space as originally thought. This will enable leaving a bit more of the space along Avenue G open to maintain the view of the Ney Museum from the pool area.

Now the bad news:

- The large post oak by the log cabin has reached the end of its life and will have to be taken down.
 There is a plan to use wood from it for benches to honor its service to the countless children who have climbed and sat upon it over its many decades.
- New interpretations of health department codes make it necessary to add height to all the pool fences for security purposes.
- New interpretations of health department codes require having a gatekeeper at each pool entrance or exit.
- New interpretations of health department codes have determined that the drains in the pool are too far apart and could be hazardous.
- In addition, the pool is leaking 35,000 gallons of water a day.
- Remediation of these items would cost approximately \$108,000. Considering that the entire budget for running all the city pools for the season is approximately \$900,000, this likely means that the pool will not be open this summer.
- If all goes well, the pool could be ready for the 2018 season.

Kevin Heyburn, co-President, brought us the news that Steering Committee Member-For-Life Dorothy Richter (who recently turned 95) is back at home continuing to recover. We signed cards for her that wished her the best of health.

Lorre Weidlich shared the draft of a letter to be sent to Mayor Adler concerning CodeNEXT.

- Kevin Heyburn offered that he had seen Mayor Adler at a meeting of the Austin Neighborhoods Council and on that occasion the Mayor volunteered to speak at an HPNA General Meeting. In response to this, a friendly amendment to the letter was proposed, stating that we offered the Mayor "friendly welcome to appear before HPNA."
- The major issues seen with CodeNEXT are the fact that there are significant mismatches between it and existing neighborhood plans (which would theoretically remain in force) and the fact that middle-class housing would continue to be lost as newer housing stock replaces older stock.
- As amended, the proposal to send the letter passed with 24 votes in favor, 1 opposed, and no abstentions.

The meeting continued with Lorre Weidlich presenting a resolution supporting the recommendations of the Flood Mitigation Task Force (available in last month's *Pecan Press*). This proposal passed with 25 votes in favor, none opposed, and no abstentions.

The proposal regarding a proposed letter to the parole board about the convicted perpetrator of the stabbing on Speedway last year was postponed.

Kevin Heyburn presented a report and resolution about the possible closure of Ridgetop Elementary School (again, available in last month's *Pecan Press*). He attended last month's FABPAC meeting, which had a large attendance that supported maintaining Ridgetop as a school and not consolidating it with Riley Elementary. Kathie Tovo, our representative on the City Council, also attended the meeting. We learned the following:

- The recommendation to close Ridgetop came from a consultant hired to find possible efficiencies, not from the AISD Board itself.
- In support of our recommendation to maintain the school, it was suggested that we canvass that part of the neighborhood to see how many young children possible future attendees live there.
- The general consensus at the meeting was that smaller schools are more effective. In addition, the dual-language program has been highly regarded. Although the dual-language program would continue at Riley, it would not be the whole school.
- The current status is that FABPAC has provided initial comment to the AISD Board, which is seeking a new bond initiative this summer. It will be the Board that has the final say.
- This proposal passed 25 votes in favor, none opposed, and 1 abstention.

Reid Long then presented a report about the proposed bicycle lanes for Speedway between 38th Street and 45th Street; this proposal is in conjunction with the planned resurfacing of the street later this year. Currently, the city is doing engineering studies and finalizing the actual proposal. Some questions and concerns arose:

Some trees have green ribbons on them. Why? Those are trees that would need to be trimmed. Clearance needs to be 14' over bike lanes as opposed to 9' over sidewalks.

Have there been comments by Speedway residents? Varied. The loss of parking has been the most frequent issue raised. Additional concerns have been raised concerning the narrowing of Speedway (the bicycle lanes would be five to six feet in width).

Would there be a provision for temporary parking? Unknown.

Finally there were some concluding announcements:

Lorre Weidlich requested a volunteer to write the "Kids' Corner" column in the Pecan Press.

Mark Fishman gave thanks to all the sponsors of It's My Park! Day, which, despite bad weather, was a rousing success with great attendance. Much work was done making the park a better place.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:57pm.

the first documented use of that phrase.

Baxter was refused burial in the city's Oakwood Cemetery because of her past, and Pierre stepped forward to offer the vacant lot adjacent to his house for her interment.

The following year, House Speaker Tyler Adkins, the legendary 'Bullmoose of the Brazos,' shot and killed a man on the front porch of Belle's establishment. Adkins said it was a duel and called it "an affair of honor." Skeptics pointed out that the dead man was unarmed and was shot in the back.

According to Audrey Bunting, the only thing that kept Adkins off the scaffold was the intervention of Supreme Court justice DeWitt Pugh, one of Adkins' card-playing buddies and a regular at Belle's, who ruled that Adkins was immune from prosecution owing to his position as head of the Texas House of Representatives.

No one claimed the body of the dead man, a South Texas rancher named Houlihan. Feeling responsible for the mishap, Belle paid for the simple funeral and prevailed upon Pierre to bury him next to Josephine.

The most poignant story is that of Belle's illegitimate son, Jean-Baptiste. By all accounts the child, said to be the offspring of Victor Trovatore, the Italian tenor who spent a week in Austin during his only American tour, was a singing prodigy. From an 1898 *Austin American* review of a performance at the Hyde Park Pavillion: "...but the highlight of the afternoon was Jean-Baptiste Gaigneux's crystalline rendition of 'Oft in the Stilly Night.' Many a crusty Hill Country goat rancher's cheek glistened, and many a lady's handkerchief was brandished, as the child's seraphic voice swept over the crowd."

Plans were being made for Jean-Baptiste to tour Europe when tragedy struck. Danton Giraud, a notorious mesmerist, had a falling out with Belle over an unpaid bill. He retaliated by hypnotizing Jean-Baptiste and telling him that when he awoke he would no longer understand the English language. And so instead of heading for glory before the crowned heads of Europe, Jean-Baptiste headed to the Texas State Lunatic Asylum on Guadalupe Street.

Often in the years that followed Hyde Park residents would hear Jean-Baptiste singing as he strolled the asylum grounds at night. Pierre always doted on the boy and visited him almost daily. When Jean-Baptiste died of unknown causes in 1907 Pierre insisted that he be buried on Avenue F.

Ironically, Pierre was the only member of the family not buried on his property. His uninsured house burned to the ground in 1910, and he began drinking

heavily. His property was seized by the county for unpaid taxes in 1912 and he was found dead on the floor next to his bed at a cheap East Austin rooming house a few months later. He was buried in a pauper's grave on 51st Street.

The story might end there, except that in recent years neighbors have reported that on cold, moonless nights a child's voice can sometimes be heard singing in the 4200 block of Avenue F. Curiously, although none have been able to identify the song, all described the child's voice as "seraphic."

City staff are looking at ways to improve access to the pool by extending the sidewalk around the park, along 44th Street and Avenue G. The current family activity pool (the wading pool) will be filled with soil and covered in sod. (Holes will be drilled in the bottom of the pool to ensure proper drainage.)

At the meeting, PARD recalled findings of the 2014 Aquatic Assessment that identified Shipe, Govalle, and Givens pools as critical pools. In the case of Shipe, the structures would require \$108,000 in repairs and general pool maintenance to bring them up to code. The pools are losing 34 thousand gallons of water each day, in effect, emptying every four days. In addition, the Health Department is requiring improvements to fences around the wading pool and the large pool, gate guards, and safety improvements to the drains.

Since PARD's budget for the fiscal year for all pools in the current aquatic system is \$900,000, the budget for Shipe Pool repairs is cost-prohibitive. Staff are recommending that PARD focus its repair dollars on pools that aren't earmarked for replacement like Shipe and Govalle pools, which will be under construction in the Fall of 2017. Friends of Shipe Park and HPNA will meet with Parks and Recreation Department leaders to explore expediting construction of the new pool as well as avenues for funding restoration of the log cabin and other improvements to our beloved park.
