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
The Arts in Hyde Park Songbird Rising

From the Desk of the Co-Presidents



Tt's hard to believe that the Hyde Park Neighborhood Association (HPNA), founded in 1974, has been around $oldsymbol{1}$ for almost fifty years. Over that time, the organization has benefited from the volunteer support of neighborhood residents who deliver the Pecan Press, coordinate social activities (think Fire Station Festival!), and participate in committees that help run the association and engage the community.

Fundamental to the function of the HPNA is the Steering Committee, which is the principal representative and policy-recommending body of the HPNA. The Steering Committee is elected and governed by HPNA's general membership. Members vote on a slate of Steering Committee candidates in the October and November timeframe. And while the Steering Committee does make policy recommendations, it must review and receive approval (in the form of a vote at a general membership

meeting) for any recommended position prior to communicating that position to the City of Austin or any other governmental body.

An up-to-date list of Steering Committee members can always be found in the *Pecan Press* and on the HPNA website (austinhydepark.org).

This past month, the current members of the Steering Committee met at the Griffin School for a three-hour, in-person work session. The ongoing pandemic has made in-person meetings a rare occurrence and the group was interested in developing a tighter working relationship while discussing topics the team hadn't had time to explore over the past year. The session opened with an ice-breaker called "Two Truths and a Lie," which required each member of the Steering Committee to share something about him- or her-

self. It's important for you to know that, among the folks representing the neighborhood, there is one person who has fallen down an open manhole, one who knows how to string a tennis racket, and one who is a black belt in the Japanese martial art of Aikido.

Our work session covered three topics: engagement and communication, review of the bylaws, and how committees are created and structured. A few key actions came out of the meeting:

- Bylaws Current HPNA bylaws need to be reviewed in light of the hybrid online and in-person meetings we will continue to host and administer for voting. A committee is forming to recommend changes to the bylaws that will be presented to general membership for a vote at the September meeting. - Communication To improve communication with the membership, Michele Grieshaber will serve as the Communication lead. The role is new and will be on point to coordinate and ensure timely updates of information regarding meetings, events, topics of high interest or urgency, and upcoming votes.

William Benham

Bill Benham, husband of Sidney Lock, father of Paul Cruz and stepfather of Cory Lock and Elizabeth Lock, and grandfather and step-grandfather of seven children, passed away on May 1, 2022.

Bill was born and bred an Austinite. He attended Austin public schools until college, when he graduated from the University of Memphis. He pursued a career as an auditor for various state organizations, finishing with the Texas State Department of Health. He loved history, particularly the history of World War II, the Austin Ballet, sports, and music. He was a passionate environmentalist. He wrote letters regularly to a variety of newspapers including the *Austin American-Statesman*, the *Houston Chronicle*, and the *Corpus Christi Caller-Times*.

Bill was known as a generous and kindly soul. He will be missed by his Hyde Park neighbors. Donations in his memory can be made to the Audubon Society or the Sierra Club.

Don Brown

Don Brown, husband of Sharon Brown, father of Andy and Gregory Brown, and grandfather of Franklin and Hattie Brown, passed away on April 22, 2022 of complications from Parkinson's disease.

Don was born in Houston and graduated from UT Austin. After that, he served in the Navy during the Vietnam War. He married Sharon in 1966. He returned to college at the University of Wisconsin, where he earned a Ph.D. in Political Science, which he subsequently taught at the University of California at Riverside. Eventually, he and his family returned to Texas, where he taught at UT Austin and then joined the staff of the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, eventually becoming Commissioner. Throughout his life, he worked for humanitarian causes, often in educational contexts. He was also known for his fine carpentry.

isa Harris welcomed everyone and outlined the agenda.

Rob Faubion, Chief Community Engagement Officer with AGE of Central Texas, gave a presentation on the organization.

- AGE was founded as Austin Groups for the Elderly 36 years ago. The organization was founded by members of the community in hopes of providing resources to the elderly.
- AGE is designed to operate like a social club for those being served. AGE provides adult day health care to seniors who need help managing daily activities during the day or who are at risk of feeling isolated or lonely. At the end of the day, the seniors go home.
- AGE also offers caregiver education and resources, early memory loss support, health equipment lending, and peer-based computer classes for seniors through the AGE computer lab.

- There will be a new AGE center coming to South Austin, near South Park Meadows. AGE will also be renovating the historic 1906 campus adjacent to Hyde Park.

 Brendan Wittstruck gave an update on the I-35 reconfiguration project. Brendan is a member of the HPNA Steering Committee and is also active in the North Central I-35 Neighborhood Coalition (NCINC).
- TXDOT has moved into the next phase of work, and there will be no more public engagement until the fall. Input on alternative plans is also closed. The highway will ultimately be widened significantly, with new interchanges.

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

- The project covers the area from 290 East to the North and Ben White to the South. TXDOT is proposing to remove upper decks and widen the highway. This is going to cause the forced sale of private property in Cherrywood. Downtown will look more like a boulevard, with parts of the highway possibly being covered by cap-and-stitch. *Capping* is the process of covering the highway with a plaza and *stitching* is running widened bridges across lowered portions of the highway. Last month the city retained a third party to study the cap-and-stitch areas. North Central Austin neighborhoods are fighting to get portions of the highway adjacent to their neighborhoods capped, like downtown.
- Brendan reported the final design will most likely not be pedestrian friendly. Designs are available online. The NCINC is focused on getting more engagement from TXDOT with the neighborhoods of central Austin. NCINC will be having a meeting May 17 at the Cherrywood Coffee House.
- Questions from membership: Can HPNA join the coalition? HPNA has not joined the coalition, but Brendan would love for HPNA to join.
- Is TXDOT considering removing large trucks from I-35 and requiring them to take an alternate route around Austin? NCINC has asked this question to TXDOT but has not received a positive response from TXDOT; TX-DOT says 85% of I-35 traffic is local and rerouting large trucks would not result in much of a traffic reduction.
- Are they looking at removing the roundabout at 51st street? No, it will stay the way it is even though it's not pedestrian or bicycle friendly.




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

Update on Guadalupe Storm Drain Project. The City of Austin's Watershed Protection Department, currently working on the construction plan part of the Guadalupe Storm Drain Project, is adjusting its schedule for the project: the engineering design will require an extra year to incorporate additional project elements. The estimated start of construction is now 2025. The project will now include improvements to the water and wastewater lines in the project area, an addition requested by Austin Water. Combining drainage and waterline improvements will be more efficient in terms of cost and construction impact to the neighborhood. Kevin Heyburn facilitated a vote on a resolution to authorize HPNA leaders to make small expenditures of HPNA funds without prior approval of the general membership.

• The resolution is as follows:

The HPNA authorizes each HPNA officer and the Steering Committee to pay expenses on behalf of the HPNA as indicated below. Each HPNA officer and the Steering Committee can approve any single expense up to the amount designated for that officer or the Steering Committee in column one, until the accumulative spending reaches the budgeted amount for the specific budget line item.

Once the budget line item is met or if there is no corresponding budget line item, each HPNA officer and the Steering Committee can approve any single expenses up to the amount cited in column two.

The HPNA Treasurer shall not pay any expense unless approved in writing by the designated person, according to the table below. Only the Treasurer is authorized to pay expenses on behalf of the HPNA.

- Lisa Harris seconded the resolution, and the resolution was opened for discussion and questions. There was no discussion or questioning.
- The vote was held, and the resolution passed with 18 in favor, 0 opposed, and 2 abstentions.


Recent and Upcoming HPNA Highlights and Activities

Songbird Rising offers private lessons, group classes, theory classes, early childhood music classes, and summer camps. We also host two school recitals a



year and regular Suzuki book recitals and provide fun performance opportunities around Austin.

Shinichi Suzuki, the founder of the Suzuki method, said "music exists for the purpose of growing an admirable heart." This sentiment is reflected in our school motto, "Growth, Joy, Community." Our school exists for the purpose of reaching our potential as teachers, musicians, students, and friends. by Dena Houston Can Recycling One Plastic Bottle Make a Difference? It's a Start!

ne person, recycling one plastic bottle, represents a lifestyle which helps promote a healthier planet. Here is one of the most important ways recycling gives the Earth a healthier future.

Recycling Reduces the Need for Landfills - A Huge **Contributor to Climate Change**

The most pressing environmental concern with


landfills is their release of methane gas. Methane is 84 times more effective at absorbing the sun's heat than carbon dioxide, making it one of the most potent greenhouse gases and a huge contributor to climate change.



Landfills are very costly. They are designed to bury trash rather than convert and reuse it. When a landfill closes, it must be maintained for at least 30 years to prevent pollution of soil and ground water. It is very costly to protect our natural resources from landfill contamination.

How the Amount of Garbage You Produce Affects the Landfill

There are four sizes of trash carts available in Austin - 24, 32, 64, and 96 gallons. If you fill up a 96-gallon cart every week, you will add almost 5000 gallons of garbage to the landfill every year. This is equal to filling a small in-ground swimming pool. If you fill a 24-gallon cart every week, you will add only 1248 gallons of garbage to the landfill every year.



The picture above tells a chilling story. How easy it would be to get the City of Austin to Zero Waste by 2040 if we all composted and recycled. It all starts with recycling one plastic bottle!

Below is a list of how long it takes for items to decompose in a landfill:

- Plastic bags 10 to 20 years
- Glass bottle 1 million years
- Plastic Bottles 500+ years
- Wool socks 1 to 5 years
- Leather shoes 25 to 40 years
- Styrofoam cup 100 years (Source: UK Department of the Environment) All of the above items can be recycled in Austin!

Questions and Answers

How do I recycle metal screens? Metal (not fabric) screens are accepted at the Recycle & Reuse Drop Off Center.

What do I do with the plant pots and trays from the garden center? Most of them have a recycling symbol on them. If they do, they go into the blue recycling cart. Please shake the dirt off first.

What do I do with plastic bags that contained fertilizer, compost, soil, and mulch? Due to contamination, they cannot go into the plastic bag collection bin at the grocery store. These must go into the trash cart. The Recycle & Reuse Drop Off Center used to accept them, but they no longer have a buyer because of the contamination issue.


