



Storm Water Detention Pond: Fence Choices

As part of the Guadalupe Street Storm Drain Improvements project, the City of Austin is planning to construct a storm water detention pond behind the Baker Center on city-owned property. Austin Watershed Protection Department wants the feedback of the Hyde Park community on options for fencing to go around the perimeter of the pond.

<u>Hyde Park Merchants</u> Fortress Shoes Opens Flagship US Store in Duval Center

What started as a post-college trip through South America has grown into an international business centered around hand-crafted footwear with a focus on sustainability and fair trade. Fortress founder, Evan Streusand, never imagined that a vacation purchase of a pair of leather and traditional fabric boots from a Peruvian shoemaker would prove to be one of the most crucial decisions of his life.

The evolution of Fortress shoes began in 2010 as an import business of Peruvian boots and shoes and grew into a multi-brand enterprise including the Huma Blanco line from Adriana Crocco, a third-generation Italian-Peruvian shoemaker with a family-owned factory and funky design aesthetic. Additional products at the store include unisex robes, Highway Robery, created from unique dead-stock fabric; slippers and blankets made from Peruvian alpaca wool will be available soon.

> The shop is open from Monday to Saturday from 11 am to 5 pm, with plans to stay open late one Saturday each month.

Mark your calendar for the Opening Party on Saturday, November 13 from 11 am to 9 pm, with cocktails and a special 15% discount on all shoes.

Rumor has it that 2022 is likely to be the Year of the Shoe, after so many months in sneakers and sweats, so treat yourself to a pair of shoes and pick up a few holiday gifts for others on your list.

Fifteen years after his initial trip, Mr. Streusand, a neighborhood resident, opened his flagship US store in Hyde Park at the Duval Center. The space, designed by local firm JS Dwellings (founded by Jackie Streusand, Evan's wife), offers the perfect environment for the display of shoes from Fortress and sister brand Huma Blanco, candles from Brooklyn Candle Studio, robes, and locally made jewelry from NVMBR DCMBR. The clean wooden lines of shelves and display racks contrast nicely with variously textured fabrics and rugs to create a sophisticated and welcoming atmosphere tucked in between neighborhood favorites Quack's and Julio's. The store also includes office space for both the retail distribution side and the vibrant e-commerce business. Literally pulling himself up by his bootstraps and pounding the sidewalk, Mr. Streusand began his distribution network the old-fashioned way: by visiting shops around the country with two suitcases of sample shoes. Soon orders were coming in from Portland, Seattle, San Francisco, Knoxville, Nashville, Brooklyn, and Asheville. Today, you can find Fortress shoes in boutiques all over the country – including Texas favorites, Haberdashery in Fredericksburg and Boutique M in Kerrville – as well as on major online shoe sites. The sister brand, Huma Blanco, is similarly widespread in boutiques and carried by retailers such as Anthropologie and Madewell.

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HPNA General Meeting Minutes: October 4, 2021

 ${f M}$ ichele Grieshaber welcomed everyone and outlined the agenda.

Jessica Foreman, Director of Advocacy at the League of Women Voters, discussed Prop A, which will be on the ballot in November.

- The League of Women Voters is not taking a position on Prop A; they were asked to present and explain both sides of the issue.
- The City of Austin police budget was reduced by 1/3 in 2020, mostly as a result of reorganization: Forensics, for example, was moved out of the Police Department. Also, some unfilled positions and a few cadet classes were cut.
- Save Austin Now (SAN) created a petition to get Prop A on the ballot and obtained the signatures of 27,000 residents. SAN is the organization that successfully got the public camping ban passed.

- Prop A is essentially proposing to add a new code that prescribes minimum policing requirements with the stated aim of better protecting Austin residents.
- What will Prop A do? Prop A would require that the city staff the police department so that there are two officers per 1,000 residents. This equates to approximately 300 additional staff, and staffing requirements would increase as the population goes up.

IN MEMORIAM

Kori Crow

Kori Crow, wife of Chad Crow and mother of Francis Crow, passed away in her sleep on September 21, 2021 after several extended illnesses.

After years of travel and living abroad, Kori and Chad landed in Hyde Park in 2012, where they became involved with the life of the neighborhood. Their house on Avenue D, which they restored, was one of the featured homes on the 2014 Homes Tour; and the Crows hosted the pre-tour party, for which Kori made wonderful barbecue. In October 2017, Kori, with Chad, initiated the 24 Backpacks project. She realized that kids displaced by Hurricane Harvey, currently living in evacuation centers in Austin and soon to be enrolled in AISD, would need school supplies. She and Chad acquired financial support and volunteers to assemble the backpacks and provided around 1000 school children with the supplies they needed.

In 2002, Kori and Chad founded a political consulting firm, KC Strategies, which won a series of awards. Kori herself received the Texas Blazing Star Award from the Women's Chamber of Commerce of Texas and was honored by the American Association of Political Consultants as one of the 40 best campaign professionals in the nation under 40 years of age.

In 2019, Kori gave birth to Fr ancis. Sadly, Francis will not grow up knowing his mother, but Chad requests that friends share their memories of Kori so that Francis can get to know her through those memories. Emily Puckett-Notley, a long-time friend of the *Pecan Press*, passed away on October 1, 2021, after a short illness.





Storm Water Pond Fencing Options... ...cont'd from page 1





The Guadalupe Street Storm Drain Improvements project consists primarily of installing new storm drain pipes to help the streets drain and reduce the risk of localized flooding. Construction is anticipated to begin in 2024. The detention pond is an important part of that project. It will help slow down storm water to prevent any adverse flooding impacts to areas downstream from the project area.

The pond will be 16 feet deep and for safety reasons will be closed to the public. A six-foot fence, with native or adapted plants growing at its base, will surround the pond. The City of Austin is considering three different types of fencing:

- Natural Process Concept: This draws inspiration from the soil profile and movement of water, natural layers in the earth being abstracted into varying perforation.
- Hyde Park Reference Concept: This draws inspiration from the Hyde Park neighborhood and its architecture – residential picket fences and art deco forms. This would be constructed of weathering steel posts or reinforced concrete posts.
- Standard Metal Fence: This would use a pre-fabricated metal fence that would meet safety requirements.

- Prop A also mandates that 35% of an officer's shift must be spent on "uncommitted time." The hope here is that this uncommitted time is spent on community engagement or other proactive policing. The city says that they would need to hire more than two officers per 1,000 residents to meet that 35% goal, but SAN disputes this.
- Prop A also mandates additional training requirements for officers, calls for additional compensation to be given to multilingual officers, establishes merit programs for high performers, and has a few other provisions.
- As of 2019, Austin had 1.9 officers per 1,000 residents. In total, there are currently 1,800 officer positions, of which 1,650 are filled. The police budget is 38.4% of the city's 1.2 billion budget.
- What do supporters of Prop A say? Crime is high due to police staffing crisis.
- What do opponents of Prop A say? This will pull money from other important services (firefighters, EMS, libraries, and so forth) and could result in layoffs in other areas of the city.
- 9 out of 10 council members and the mayor are against Prop A.
- What to consider when making your decision: Who should make the budget decisions? Will increased policing reduce crime? Will an increase in police funding mean a decrease in funding for other groups?
- Interestingly, studies show that the increase in homicides in Austin and other cities across the country are not tied to the number of police per residents.

Karen Saadeh and Adam Wilson facilitated a vote for three Steering Committee positions and 2 officer positions within the HPNA.


- Adam Wilson announced five candidates on the slate tonight.
- Paul Smith's term as Vice President of HPNA is up for reelection, and he has volunteered to continue his role, so he will be up for election tonight.
- Lorre Weidlich's term as co-Treasurer is also up for reelection.

- Katie Turner's term as a Steering Committee Member has ended and she will also be up for reelection tonight.
- Sumit Guha and Elena Rojo are rolling off the Steering Committee, which opens up two new Steering Committee membership opportunities. Thank you to Sumit and Elena for their service on the Steering Committee and to the neighborhood!
- Chris Wooster and Brendan Wittstruck are being nominated to fill the positions vacated by Sumit and Elena. Brendan and Chris each gave an overview of themselves; they are both Hyde Park residents and excited about the opportunity to serve on the HPNA Steering Committee.
- Karen and Adam put the five candidates' names into the Zoom chat for the membership to vote on, and members cast their votes.
- Membership cast 24 votes to reelect Paul, Lorre, and Katie and to add Brendan and Chris to the Steering Committee. There were 0 votes in opposition and 0 abstentions.
- Congratulations to new and returning members of the HPNA!

Rebeka McKay, a Supervising Engineer with the city's Watershed Protection Department, and Kim Patak, an engineer with the design firm Freese and Nichols, gave a presentation on the Guadalupe Street Storm Drain Improvement Project.

- The presentation discussed the flooding issues that have occurred on and around Avenue A and Guadalupe and what the city is doing to remediate these issues.
- This type of flooding is classified as a localized flooding issue; this means it is not adjacent to a creek or waterway.
- This project will affect curb gutters, inlets, and underground pipes that ultimately flow to the creek.
- The storm system under improvement was built in 1928 and generally follows Avenue A to Hemphill Branch at West 33rd Street.
- 28,000 linear feet of storm drains will be upgraded; improvements will be made to the ponds at The Triangle and Central Park; and a detention pond will be added to the space behind Baker School.
- These improvements won't solve all the flooding issues, but the chance of future flooding will be greatly reduced.
- The surface detention pond that will be added just west of the Baker School building will be 16 feet deep with vertical walls. The pond will be closed to the public and will be surrounded by a six-foot perimeter fence. This will be a dry facility most days and will hold water no longer than 24 hours after a rain event.

- Some design options for the type of fence that will surround the site were presented. The project will do its best to make sure the design selected for this project will work with the historic nature of our neighborhood.
- A portion of Adams Hemphill Park is also going to be used as a detention pond, but as a benefit the basketball court and other recreation facilities in the park will be renovated.
- Easement acquisition will begin in 2022 and 2023; design and permitting will be finalized in 2023; and construction will begin in 2024.
- A member asked how things like frisbees and animals can be retrieved if they get into the space. There will be an access gate, but the public will have to call Austin Watershed to retrieve items. Animals that get into the pond should be able to get out the same way they got in.
- Parking on Avenue B might be temporarily disturbed during construction, but none will be permanently eliminated.

David Butts, a political consultant, gave a short presentation on the proposed reconfiguration of the City of Austin council districts.

- An independent redistricting committee has come forth with a redistricting plan that should be finalized in November.
- Our district (district 9) will ultimately be similar to what currently exists. The biggest change to our district is that Clarksville was removed and added to district 10. Another notable change is the addition of approximately 1/3 of the Zilker neighborhood (from Lamar to Kinney) to district 9.
- David's overall assessment is that there are not a lot of changes, and Hyde Park should be largely unaffected. He said district 9 has a nice mix of young as well as established voters.
- The city's goal is for each district to be roughly the same size with 94,000 to 99,000 residents per district.

Lettuce Recycle!

Fall is a great time in Austin! The temperature is no longer 100°+ each

day and there's an energizing coolness in the air. That coolness gets us back outside and away from our airconditioned homes. working in the yard, visiting with neighbors, or just enjoying the change of season.



What does fall have to do with recycling? In November, the leaves begin to fall. It is a great time to recycle those leaves rather than send them to the landfill. Here are some ideas for leaf recycling.

Use Shredded Leaves as Mulch

Shredded leaves make the best garden mulch! Many home lawnmowers and yard service mowers have a grass and leaf shredder. As the leaves break down, they add compost to the beds without having to buy bags of compost. Great fall reuse!

Start a Compost Pile

Even though we all have curbside composting, a backyard compost pile can provide nutrient-enriched soil to our own garden beds. Composting can be easy and fun. For a home composting fact sheet, see https:// www.austintexas.gov/homecompostguide.

What Happens to the Leaves We Set Out at the Curb?

- Plastic bags of leaves left at the curb are collected as trash and the customer is charged \$9.60 + tax per bag.
- Leaves placed in the green curbside compost collection bin, paper leaf bags, and our own garbage cans are collected by the City at no charge and the contents become compost.
- Leaves that lawn services collect are often put into plastic bags and carted off to the landfill. So much for Zero Waste!

Are there things we can do if we use a lawn service and the lawn service uses the plastic bags that are sent to the landfill? Yes! Ask your lawn service to use the paper bags and leave them at your curb for pickup. The argument can be made that this saves the lawn service the drive to the landfill and the cost to dump the leaves.

Question from a Reader

How do I recycle bottles of lotion and creams that I cannot clean out? Bottles and tubes of lotions, shampoo, conditioner, and so forth can go to the Recycle & Reuse Drop Off Center. These items (even if partially full) will go into their free reuse store. Many homeless people come to this store to get items they need. Any items that are not used are sent to their hazardous materials area and disposed of properly. If going to the RRDOC isn't an option, these bottles must go into your trash can.
