

Things Are Starting to Happen at Shipe Park!

If you have been by Shipe Park recently, you might have noticed that work has begun on park improvements. Here are the latest status reports:

Log Cabin

Renovation of the Log Cabin began in September. Improvements will include making the restrooms ADA compliant, re-roofing, replacing chinking, and other exterior repairs. The City of Austin has completed most of the bathroom renovation. Contractor James Nolan will renovate the cabin's exterior. He was scheduled to begin tree protection and site protection on September 17 and demolition on the roof on September 24.

Proposed Amendment to the FY18 Budget: Allocation of \$5,000 to Shipe Park Improvements

A mong the goals of the Hyde Park Neighborhood Association are the development and preservation of natural green spaces like creeks, parks, and trees and appropriate general land use. Shipe Park is an important space for both the immediate neighborhood and our broader Austin community; at Shipe, we come together to play, celebrate, and engage.

To this end, the Hyde Park Neighborhood Association is requesting membership approval to allocate \$5,000 to the Austin Parks Foundation for improvements to Shipe Park. Half of these funds will come from revenue from the 2018 Homes Tour and the other half will come from Hyde Park Neighborhood Association budgetary reserves.

Helping Hand Home for Children Resolution

The Hyde Park Neighborhood Association (HPNA) supports the Helping Hand Home for Children in the following proposed rezoning and other changes to its properties on Avenue B between 38th and 38 ½ Streets.

1. A zoning change to the properties located at 3807 Avenue B and 310 W. 38th Street. These properties are currently zoned SF-3-NCCD-NP and the request is to rezone them to MF-4-NCCD-NP to match 312 W. 38th Street, 3803 Avenue B, and 3805 Avenue B, which are already zoned MF-4.

2. The following changes to the Hyde Park Neighborhood Conservation Combining District (NCCD) (Ordinance No. 02013131-20):

The addition of the following provision to Part 6: Congregate living shall be a permitted use on 310 and 312 W. 38th Street and 3803 and 3805 Avenue B, with a limit of ten residents per residential structure.

Barring weather delays, he expects to complete the project by the end of November. (During construction the City of Austin will provide a portable restroom for park users.)

Heritage Tree Work

The City of Austin Forestry Department has contracted with **Austin Tree Experts** to regrade and aerate around the large heritage tree adjacent to the Log Cabin. The plan is to use trenching and an air space to remove a laver of dirt (up to 8") around the base of the tree and to aerate the remaining soil. There will also be regrading to divert water runoff away from the cabin. This

work is designed to ensure the long-term health of the tree. Work on this project should be completed by early October.

New Swimming Pool

Construction on the new pool should begin by late October. After Austin's first solicitation for bids ended with a disqualified general contractor, the city was successful with its second solicitation. It identified a compliant general contractor, and on August 30,

the City Council approved the low bid contractor, G. Hyatt, and the construction amount. The total construction contract amount is \$3,217,500.

On September 12, the final Site Development Permit was issued for the pool. In mid-September, Public Works Project Manager Sergio Altamirano reported that the Notice to Proceed for start of construction phase was anticipated to be issued on October 1,

2018. Final completion of the pool facility is anticipated in early summer 2019.

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At this point, the City of Austin's estimated project schedule is the following:

- Late September Council approval of construction contract
- Early October Construction contract negotiations
- Late October 2018.... Pool construction start
- June 2019.....Substantial completion

Park Improvements in Wading Pool Area

As part of the new swimming pool project, the current wading pool will be decommissioned (that is, demolished). This will leave a large, unimproved space between the Log Cabin and the playscape. Friends of Shipe Park are working with the City of Austin on a plan to make the following improvements to this area:

- Fill in wading pool area, regrade, and resurface with bark mulch
- Relocate large swing set
- Add four picnic tables
- Add four benches

This project will be done contemporaneously with the pool construction and should be completed by June 2019. Most of the projects in the wading pool area will be privately funded.

Funding Shipe Improvements

Estimated costs for the above projects are as follows:

- Swimming Pool (including renovation of cabin bathrooms and decommissioning of wading pool): \$3,217,500
- Log Cabin exterior renovations: \$50-60,000
- Wading Pool area: \$20,000

The City of Austin will provide funding for construction of the swimming pool and cabin bathrooms. The other projects will be funded as follows:

- Austin Parks Foundation grant: \$50,000
- Private funding to match APF grant: \$34,000










Austin Marathon Seeks Hyde Park Input




2. LABEL YARD KID (It's made by Longhorn Dam)



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Helping Hands Home: A Plan for the Future

Helping Hand Home has been in the Hyde Park community since 1925, when the Rotary Club of Austin donated the land to Helping Hand Home to build a home for children.


Initially an orphanage, the Home has transformed over the years into a congregate living center, charter school, and foster and adoption program for abused and neglected children in this community. Most recently, the Home has added at-home support services to our nationally accredited continuum of services. However, the mission of Helping Hand Home has not changed: to provide a nurturing and therapeutic home for abused and neglected children and to restore each child to a healthy family setting. Today, the Home serves children on both sides of Avenue B as well as children and families in foster and adoptive homes in the Central Texas community. Helping

Hand's use of best practices, extremely low child-tostaff ratios, national accreditation, and progressive approach to healing have contributed to making

Helping Hand the most respected provider in Texas for children aged 4 to 13 traumatized by abuse and neglect.

Helping Hand Home's connections to the Hyde Park neighborhood are many. Half of our children attend Lee Elementary, where they are welcomed with open arms by the teachers and students. Hyde Park residents have, over the years, volunteered their time, contributed as donors, and, most importantly, provided forever homes to our children through our foster and adoption program. Virginia Duke, a resident of Avenue C, has volunteered

and been involved in Helping Hand Home's leadership for 50 years. The Home honored John Hewlett, Lee Elementary principal, as a Champion for Children at our 2017 annual luncheon that recognized community leaders who are dedicated to creating a better

future for our children.

The maxim, "To Whom Much is Given, Much is Expected," inspired our most recent strategic plan for growth, in which our leadership and Board of Direc-

tors committed to developing a master plan to renovate and expand the facilities on the east side of Avenue B between 38th and 38 ½ Street. The plan has elements of both program expansion and program enhancement. Helping Hand Home is proposing to add a maximum of 40 beds to replace the 25 existing beds. The additional beds will not only allow Helping Hand to serve more children but will also allow us to decrease the number of children in each home, allowing us to provide more individualized attention and to accelerate their healing

process. In addition to the new housing, the project will include an educational building to house a five-class-room University of Texas-HHH Charter School for the children, together with a new multipurpose room for

Wow! Did October ever take its time getting here? It's lovely and it's fall!


The Elisabet Ney Museum staff is truly excited to announce the beginning of a series of collaborative events with the Austin Chapter of the Native Prairie Association of Texas (NPAT). On Saturday, October 6, at 10am, the museum and the NPAT will

present the annual Fall Landscape Tour. This time is a particularly excellent time to visit because it's planting season. Join knowledgeable professionals giving tours and offering you a chance to work on the landscape yourself. Before and after the tour, NPAT volunteers will be here to help you manage this precious native prairie restoration and learn about it for your own enjoyment. if you are interested in setting up a native landscape in your yard, this is a great way to learn from the pros! You'll also discover the many species we have here and maybe even leave with some seeds.

Also, continuing on exhibition is Whitney Turetzky: Feminine Grandeur. Whitney's modified historical photos tell a visual story of feminine grandeur in which women are glorified and magnified into spiritual superstars. But far from flashy, gaudy comic art, the result is a moving depiction of normal women, most of them nameless, celebrated in a rich, textured, contemporary but empathetic way. The exhibition runs through November 25.

Duval Street Update. The Public Works Department had the capacity to perform routine street maintenance (resurfacing) on Duval Street from 45th Street to 53rd Street earlier than anticipated, which changes the phasing for implementing the Duval bike lane project. The revised phasing is as follows:

Phase 1:

- Resurfacing of Duval Street between 45th Street and 53rd Street (underway).
- Construction of a shared use path along the northbound approach to 45th Street (underway).
- Modifications to parking restrictions on Duval Street south of 53rd Street to San Jacinto Boulevard.
- Restriping between 45th Street and 53rd Street to include buffered bicycles lanes between 45th Street and 50th Street and bicycle lanes between 50th Street and 53rd Street.

Phase 2:

- Installation of painted buffers to existing bicycle lanes south of 45th Street
- Modifications to striping near signalized intersections south of 45th Street to San Jacinto Boulevard.
- Enhanced pedestrian crossing treatments at Harris Avenue, 41st Street, and 43rd Street

The addition of the following provisions to Part 7:

- \bullet The property at 3807 Avenue B may front on 38 $1\!\!/\!2$ Street.
- The property at 3807 Avenue B may include parking closer than 10 feet to the property line on W. 38 ½ Street.
- The property at 3807 Avenue B may include a driveway that exceeds 25 feet and more than one curb cut.
- The property at 3807 Avenue B may include headin parking.
- The five-lot area consisting of 310 and 312 W. 38th Street and 3803, 3805, and 3807 Avenue B may include a surrounding fence up to 6' in height. The fence must have a ratio of open space to solid material of not less than 1 to .25.
- Buildings on 310 and 312 W. 38th Street and 3803 and 3805 Avenue B may have entrances that are not on the front of the building. However, those buildings shall be constructed so that their appearance suggests street-facing entrances.

The HPNA recognizes that the Helping Hand Home provides an invaluable service for children who have experienced physical, emotional, and sexual abuse; neglect; or abandonment. It is our understanding that the proposed development will enhance this service by expanding the on-site congregate residential living and educational facilities.
