

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Fire Station Festival

On October 23, 2022, the Fire Station Festival will take place from 4 to 6 pm, continuing its fifty year support of the neighborhood landmark. Co-chairs Ashley Aarons and Stefanie Bertram organized the event to combine favorite past activities with new traditions. The children's costume parade will begin at Shipe Park at 3:30 pm and will end at Fire Station #9 at 4301 Speedway. The Fire Station Festival, started by Dorothy Richter, began as an effort to save our neighborhood fire station. Deaton Bednar, longtime friend of Dorothy and HPNA resident, wrote the following summary of the event's origins, shared from Dorothy's personal papers and interview.

"They made her mad. It was October 1971. The city's decision to close the 1929 Fire Station #9 was not known in the neighborhood. No fire station close by meant life and property-threatening response times for emergencies. The planned closure wasn't considered newsworthy by the local newspaper. The city manager said the neighbors don't have anything to worry about. One of the council members thought the building could be a rehearsal space for Austin Ballet Society. Dorothy questioned the information touted as their reason for closure. This self-described 'quiet housewife' was mad and frustrated.

She needed to sound the alarm. How could the neighborhood's voices be heard, she wondered. A demonstration! Children riding around the station on bikes, trikes, and push carts with signs: 'Councilmen! Councilmen! Save our Station.' She called the press and TV stations. A newspaper photo shows one of the signs with 'Save us from Hell.' TV stations carried the story. Then came a neighborhood meeting. Council members' phone numbers distributed. Fifty residents packed the council chambers on the day the vote was to be made. The 'quiet housewife' wore a fireman's helmet to show that residents would have to save their own homes. But before she could present, the Mayor said the council members had been inundated with calls from irate citizens and recognized the large public turnout at the meeting. He wished to spare the group a needless discussion. It was moved, seconded, and passed to keep Fire Station #9 open.

What if this 'quiet housewife' had been quiet in 1971? Today, because of the voice of Dorothy Richter, the fire station building is newly renovated and has a plaque honoring her. We have an active neighborhood association and each year, we gather together to celebrate our community and Fire Station #9."

Bylaws Vote

At its September meeting, the HPNA will vote on changes to its bylaws. The procedure, following *Roberts' Rules of Order*, will be as follows:

- 1. There will be a motion and a second to approve the bylaws as published in the July issue of the *Pecan Press*. The motion will then be open for discussion.
- 2. During the subsequent discussion, members may introduce amendments to the proposed bylaws. Previously suggested amendments are listed below, but members may introduce other amendments as well.
- 3. Each amendment will be discussed and voted on separately.
- 4. After all proposed amendments have been voted on, the published bylaws, as amended by membership votes during the discussion, will be voted on by the membership.

Suggested Amendments

Changes to existing language are in italics. IV. Goals:

- Third bullet: To support and engage in activities and policies that promote social and economic diversity, equity, access, and inclusion in Hyde Park and among its residents and *take steps to acknowledge and remedy the legacy of Hyde Park's history as a segregated neighborhood.* proposed by Duncan Meisel
- Fifth bullet: To promote the preservation and celebration of historically significant buildings *and features* in Hyde Park and to support and preserve the Elisabet Ney Museum. – proposed by Karen McGraw
- Sixth bullet: To participate in the observance of city zoning and *development* codes and to help address zoning and *development* concerns in Hyde Park and surrounding areas. proposed by Karen McGraw

- Twelfth bullet: To work towards the establishment and maintenance of standards that preserve and enhance the unique character of Hyde Park *including the Hyde Park Neighborhood Plan, the Hyde Park NCCD, the North Hyde Park NCCD, the Hyde Park National Register District, and the Hyde Park Local Historic District.* – proposed by Karen McGraw
- IX. Voting:
- Introductory paragraph: A recorded vote of the membership is required for the following *actions* as well as for any other issue for which a record is appropriate:
 proposed by Karen McGraw
- XII. Representatives and Committees, B. Standing Committees:
- Development Review Committee: This committee will deal with questions of proposed development within the boundaries of HPNA. If HPNA *desires* to provide an opinion to the City for a particular development case or *issue (such as a code change)*, the Development Review Committee will report its findings to the Steering Committee and the Steering Committee can vote in support or opposition. *Either committee* may also request that a developer present plans to *that* committee. The Steering Committee can decide to refer the case to the membership for vote.
 proposed by Karen McGraw
- Preservation Committee: This committee will receive and consider actions on review of properties in the historic district as well as any new proposals for designation or demolition. Its opinion will be conveyed to the DRC and Steering Committee. – proposed by Karen McGraw



As we move into October, there will be much more to come, including the legendary Polkapocalypse! We look forward to celebrating the fall season and cooler weather!



Hyde Park Water and Wastewater Renewal Project. The Hyde Park Water and Wastewater Renewal Project is part of Renewing Austin, an Austin Water program to replace and upgrade aging water lines. Austin Water is protecting our city's water infrastructure by investing in upgrades and repairs of the existing water lines. Water line breaks are well documented in this area and the project is necessary to avoid further expenditures to maintain water lines that have broken frequently. The project will replace about 18,940 linear feet of water and wastewater lines. Visit the project website, *austintexas.gov/hydeparkwater*, for more information and to sign-up to receive email updates about the project. You can find answers to most frequently asked questions in the project fact sheet and the April 2022 public meeting presentation. Both of these documents are also saved on the project website.

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Hyde Parker Contributes to Austin Chronicle Article. Jim Ellinger, Hyde Park resident and citizen journalist, contributed both his words and a photograph to the article "Sonic Warfare?" by Brant Bingamon, published in the July 29 issue of the *Austin Chronicle*. The article begins, "Since moving to Austin in 1980, Jim Ellinger has attended more demonstrations Downtown than he cares to remember." Jim reported on the presence of a long-range acoustic device (LRAD) at a demonstration on July 2 at City Hall protesting the Supreme Court decision overturning *Roe v. Wade*. 






<u>Local Business Spotlight</u> First Light Books

Well-traveled and well-read go hand-in-hand with the wife-and-husband duo Robin and Taylor Bruce. Running a publishing house and travel imprint, Wildsam, Taylor publishes aesthetically appealing field guides to cities, road trips, and national parks along with other travel-inspired art prints and gifts. Now the couple will bring their love of print media to Austin through their new bookshop in the heart of Hyde Park. First Light Books, to be located in the old post office on 43rd Street and Speedway, with the expected opening date of mid-March, 2023, is much anticipated by neighbors and book-loving Austinites alike. Robin and Taylor sat down with me a few weeks ago for a short interview.

What drew you to the post office location? First Light Books has been a dream that we've had for a long time, and when we came across the post office we thought it was a dream location. It's so walkable and



tucked into the neighborhood. It's quiet and welcoming for customers to linger. We hope people might go to Quack's and then stop by to pick up a book.

Are you going to specialize in any specific genre? First Light Books will be an all-purpose indie bookstore: it will have small sections that hit every note. But we want to be creative while specializing within each section: seasonal offerings, or working with professionals in the city and the neighborhood who are knowledgeable about their fields to curate the selection – like if there's an architect in the neighborhood, asking that architect what ten books in the world of architectural design he or she thinks are really interesting. Also, there will be a big kid's section.

We plan to have a strong membership program because we recognize the limits of budgets, time, and book needs. We want to position the bookstore to where it can be price competitive with Amazon on certain offerings.


What kind of events do you plan on having? Author release events for sure, but there's no reason why you can't stretch beyond that and treat the bookstore like a non-bookstore in event strategy. Like can music or food be part of events? Can the pizza truck come up and park at the bookstore every Friday night? We want to have fun with it and surprise people. Our hope, too, is that the neighborhood sees it as a place that they can use for gathering, like the neighborhood association, that sort of stuff. The bookstore would love to be a partner to those sorts of events.



What is the need for independent bookstores in the year 2022? More books have been sold in 2022 than there ever have been, and people love places that are built around that pastime. People are wanting to get out of this algorithmic "you bought this so you might like this" life. I want a more organic experience, more relational, more of a surprise by what you might find. The feeling of browsing in a bookstore — nothing is better in terms of shopping. Maybe a farmers market is similar? I want people to find themselves on our bookstore shelves.

Lettuce Recycle! by Dena Houston The Lonely Mailbox #2



Ceveral years ago, I wrote about how to **D**reduce junk mail. I have now revised this article to include new facts and new ways to reduce it. Almost all of my mail used to go directly from my mailbox to my blue bin. Junk mail seems to be just a fact of life, but we can greatly reduce the amount of *unwanted* mail by doing just a few things. We can also reduce the amount of non-junk mail.

Junk Mail Facts

- The average American household receives 848 pieces of junk mail (equal to 1.5 trees) every year - almost 190 million trees for all U.S. households.
- Over 100 billion pieces of junk mail is sent through the postal system each year.
- The EPA reports that 60% of all junk mail ends up in landfills and therefore is not recycled. Americans pay \$370 million annually to dispose of the junk mail that does not get recycled.
- Junk mail adds 1 billion pounds of waste to landfills each year.

How to Reduce Unwanted Mail

- Weekly Grocery Store Flyers (Red Plum) To stop receiving these flyers, visit https://www.redplum.com/ tools/redplum-postal-addremove.html.
- Unwanted Mail or Catalogs Go to https://catalogchoice.org/. Its mission is to stop junk mail for good. It is a non-profit service that sends merchants your optout request or guides you how to do it.

- Other Catalogs When your order something online, a catalog often arrives within a week from that same company. By calling the company, you can request that it no longer sends its catalog.
- Don't Sign Up for Things You Don't Need Every time you fill out a Request for Information form, you get on a mailing list. Be selective in the information you request.

How to Receive Mail That Is Not Junk Mail

Magazines – Most magazines are available online. Just call and request that option.

Bills And Credit Card Statements - Almost all bills, including utility and credit card statements, can be received electronically. Select "go paperless" from the website.

My Mail Reducing Experience

On average, we receive about ten pieces of mail a week. Our mail carrier is impressed! However, it is my experience that there is some mail you cannot stop. My husband has spent a lot of time on the phone trying to stop mail from certain companies, but to no avail. Do your best, but try to keep the objective in perspective. Anything you reduce helps the planet (and your mail carrier).

Questions From Our Readers

What do I do with old complimentary-size shampoo bot*tles and lotions?* These can go to the Recycle & Reuse Drop-off Center. They will be recycled as Hazardous Materials.

How do I dispose of a bag of cement mix? You can take it to the Recycle and Reuse Drop-off Center.

Are there any dusters that are reusable? Yes, Swiffer now makes a washable duster that fits onto the handheld duster wands and mops.


