
See You There!

Attacker Still at Large As Victim of Assault Recovers, Police Ask for Information from the Public

As many of you are aware, a violent crime took place right here in Hyde Park in the early morning hours of November 14.

The victim, a local nurse whose name is being withheld for her safety, was attacked by a knife-wielding stranger around 7:23 am on the corner of 44th Street and Speedway as she sat enjoying some sunshine on her day off after working the night shift. Her 21 stab wounds were initially considered life-threatening, but after six days in the hospital, she is now recovering. However, because tendons were cut in her hands as she defended herself, doctors say she cannot work for three months, and she may never be able to return to her nursing profession.

This was a very serious crime, and the violent attacker is still at large. Unfortunately, not much progress has been made in the

Resolutions for Vote at January HPNA Meeting

Resolution Regarding Type 2 Short Term Rentals

The Hyde Park Neighborhood Association (HPNA) supports the recommendations of the Planning Commission regarding type 2 short term rentals (STRs) and asks that City Council adopt the Planning Commission's proposed ordinance. In particular, the HPNA asks that any ordinance include the following principles:

- Phase out Type 2 STRs from residential neighborhoods.
- Require bad-actor STRs to seek conditional use permits from the Planning Commission.
- Establish a six-person occupancy limit for STRs regardless of whether the occupants are related or unrelated.
- Establish a 1,000 feet distance separation between type 2 STRs.
- Enact stiffer penalties and higher fines for STR violations and clearly define all violations and penalties.
- Utilize the administrative hearing process of the Building and Standards Commission (BSC) for STR complaints and violations.
- Supplement the Property Maintenance Code to facilitate the BSC's jurisdiction over STRs.

Resolution Regarding Flooding

WHEREAS the Austin neighborhood known as Hyde Park has witnessed increased flooding during rainfall events over the last 2 years; AND

WHEREAS the City of Austin has confirmed that Hyde Park drainage infrastructure was built out in the 1930s, has not been significantly updated since installation, and is in need of major infrastructure improvements; AND

WHEREAS the retention pond at the northwest corner of Guadalupe and 45th Street has failed to perform as designed, the City of Austin has cited The Triangle property management group for failures to maintain said retention pond, and water from said retention pond has spilled over onto Guadalupe contributing to flooding in Hyde Park on multiple occasions; AND

WHEREAS residents of Hyde Park have incurred property damage as a direct result of flooding during the last 2 years;

The Hyde Park Neighborhood Association requests the following actions on behalf of all Hyde Park residents:

EXPEDITED APPROVAL of funds required to begin improvements to neighborhood drainage infrastructure; AND

ADDITIONAL INSPECTIONS of the retention pond at the northwest corner of Guadalupe and 45th Street INCLUDING ad-hoc inspections for debris, overgrowth, and other potential blockages directly preceding any day when heavy rainfall is forecasted; AND

ENGINEERING REVIEW AND REPORT on development growth and impervious cover culminating in a recommendation for drainage infrastructure improvements necessary to mitigate current and anticipated future growth needs for Hyde Park and surrounding neighborhoods.

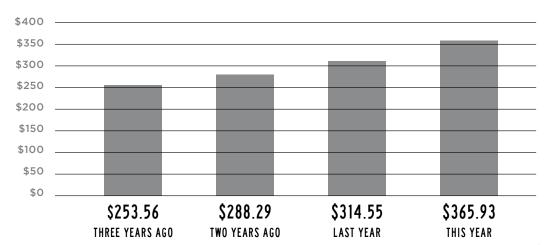

The *Dance of the Cosmos* at the Elisabet Ney Museum

The XYZ Atlas grew out of a project in which Austin artist Jennifer Chenoweth and friends started asking questions about what creates attachment to places. The Hedonic Map of Austin, launched in 2013, is a map of the collective emotional highs and lows of people living in and visiting our city. Through an interactive question and answer series, hundreds of participants answer a 20-question survey about their life experiences and where they occurred. The locations were captured in a GIS mapping system and coded to an emotional color chart. A positive experience is raised on the map, and a negative experience is lowered. When emotion is connected to location, location is no longer space, but place. The mapping event was featured at the Ney during the first weekend of the annual West Austin Studio Tour, or WEST.

The Museums and Cultural Centers of the Austin Parks and Recreation Department is a collaborator on the XYZ Atlas. The charismatic installation on the Elisabet Ney Museum property, on its 45th street border, *Dance of the Cosmos*, was created in May 2015 for a year-long temporary installation at the Museum through the City of Austin Parks Cultural Arts Division Core Funding Program. *Dance of the Cosmos* was inspired by a Tibetan lotus mandala and a diagram

of the color wheel, to visualize the concept of acceptance and emotional wholeness, reflecting its relationship to the XYZ Atlas project. The piece's steel sphere is 54" in diameter and was cut into 8 lunes, or hosohedrons. Those are mechanized through steel arms that

are attached to an actuator that is powered through solar energy. The mechanical sculpture sits on a 20' diameter base of 40 interlocking concrete tiles coated with pigment. The base is a Venn diagram of the color spectrum, representing a wide range of emotional states, the basis of the XYZ Atlas. The sculpture is on temporary loan to the Elisabet Ney Museum through spring 2016. Jennifer Chenoweth worked with mechanical engineer John Dolecek and fabricator Robert Whitehurst to build the piece. Lighthouse Solar sponsored its solar consulting and installation. Enjoy it this Spring!






case, as police don't have much to go on. The victim only remembers her attacker as a white female wearing dark clothes who had dark brown or black curly hair and a smile on her face as she stabbed the victim. The victim suspects that the attacker knows the neighborhood well, because of the route she took as she ran away. As the victim herself stated on Reddit, "I was having a serene moment in nature where I was closing my eyes to enjoy the pure beauty that is life. This is a stark reminder ... that crime happens to innocent people who are in the wrong place at the wrong time with the wrong person around. This person is still on the loose and could easily strike again."

The Crime & Safety Co-Chairs, myself and Carol Welder, would like the victim to know that the neighborhood is working with the police to help find her attacker and the neighborhood fully supports her during her recovery.





News from the Ney

Happy New Year everyone, from the staff at the Elisabet Ney Museum!

The year 2015 was terrific, featuring lots of growth and change at the Ney Museum. There were several truly successful events. The Ney's summer camp, Visual Literacy: Storytelling through Art, had its second great year. The Elisabet Ney Museum Writer in Residence program got off to a grand start with Austin author Mary Helen Specht's two-week tenure in the Museum's tower. The Museum made great strides in collaborative programming for the City of Austin as well, building new relationships with groups as varied as The Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center and Fusebox, Austin's internationally renowned annual performance art festival. The landscape continues to draw admirers, especially in the Spring, and thousands of people learned more about the amazing Elisabet Ney, her works and her legacy.

The museum also featured the 2016 Wish Tree, on which numerous thoughts were shared, from the poignant to the silly. Presented with the help of the HPNA, the tree has attracted new admirers and made new friends both through visits and through postings on social media.

And, of course, the site had two large temporary sculptures installed. Jennifer Chenoweth's *Dance of the Cosmos* was the featured artwork of 2015-16, and Jack Sanders' *Construction Event*, part of the Drawing Lines project, represented the changes – and fun – that District 9, Hyde Park's City Council district, is known for. Jack's piece will be leaving in January, but Jennifer's will remain until Ney Day 2016, at which time another piece from another artist – yet to be determined – will take its place.

The museum plans to expand its calendar, holding the highly anticipated annual events – Ney Day, Portraiture in the Park, and Polkapocalypse! – as well as several exciting smaller events throughout the coming year. You will hear about most of them in the pages of this publication and through social media and the HPNA listsery.

January, however, will feature the popular January Drawing Salons. At 10 am every Saturday morning, museum staff will be on hand to open the doors early and guide you through drawing exercises using the sculptures as models. All the materials and tools you'll need are provided, and the classes are free! Share your talents with your neighbors at this unique program, open to all ages. More events will come in February, so keep your eyes and ears open or join the Museum's email list.
