PUDs and The Grove

City ordinances that regulate the development of Planned Unit Developments (PUDs) make it easier for developers to get PUDs approved on formerly state-owned land that has never been previously zoned. A \$500 million mixed-use development project called "The Grove" is seeking city approval to build on former state land near Shoal Creek and 45th street. The large size of The Grove develop-

ment has concerned many nearby neighborhoods, including Hyde Park.

Much of the west side of Hyde Park is bordered by land owned by the State and thus unzoned. If this land is ever re-developed, we think Hyde Park should have input in the zoning decisions, to ensure the new development does not negatively impact Hyde Park's quality of life. Much of Hyde Park's infrastructure was built in the 1930s, and the neighborhood's current roads and flooding systems can't meet the needs of increased development either in Hyde Park or in neighborhoods nearby. It is imperative that we maintain our ability to advocate for the neighborhood and ensure that neighborhood infrastructure can keep up with increased development. HPNA's Steering Committee recently posted a letter to the neighborhood list serve informing the membership of efforts to convince the City Council to treat approval of PUDs on unzoned and previously zoned property the same. We welcome neighbors' thoughts on this issue.

While The Grove development will not be contiguous to Hyde Park, it will impact our neighborhood with increased traffic along 38th and 45th streets. HPNA will continue to monitor the develop-



ment of The Grove and its impact on the neighborhood.

Editor's Note: Hyde Park lost two friends last month, HPNA Treasurer I.Jay Aarons and long-time Hyde Park resident Carol Wyche. We mourn their passing and send our condolences to their families and loved ones.

I.Jay Aarons

"Whoever enjoys his life is doing the Creator's will." — Jewish proverb

n January 18, 2016, Hyde Park lost...well, how do you describe I.Jay Aarons? Hyde Park's am-



bassador to the world, the neighborhood's best citizen and most ubiquitous presence, our dearest friend, the sweetest guy you ever met? All that and more.

If you weren't friends with I.Jay, it's because you hadn't met him. I Jay was

ubiquitous, and friendship with I.Jay had no beginning and no end. It didn't begin with a bang; suddenly you just noticed he was in your life and you had known him forever, like family. He was the glue that bonded you to a million people, to a community, a real community, the one outside your door, the one that is Hyde Park, and Austin.

I.Jay gave of himself like few people ever do. He was thoroughly involved in his community as a leader, but never as a politician, though he had a gift for getting along with everyone. As a community leader, I.Jay served on the Steering Committee of the Hyde

Carol Wyche

Long-time Hyde Park resident Carol Jean Olson Wyche died on January 21, 2016, at her Avenue F home, after a two-year battle with breast cancer.

Carol lived a rich and multi-faceted life. She was



born in 1945 in Omaha, Nebraska. She attended Rice University, where she majored in German, and then spent two years in the Marines before coming to Austin to major in linguistics at the University of Texas.

She was a consummate teacher. Her belief that there was always

more than one way to learn something attracted students to her. She worked for the Austin State Hospital for five years as a special education teacher, home schooled her sister's two children, and taught English as a second language for several non-profit and for-profit organizations. She concluded her official teaching career at Huntington-Surrey School, a private day high school, where she taught German. At Huntington-Surrey School, her ability to mentor difficult students won her respect and admiration from her peers. Along the way, she acquired certifications for teaching Yoga and teaching the Usui system of Natural Healing.

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

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The Arts in Hyde Park Nancy Mims at the Ney Museum

Striking floral panels by local artist Nancy Mims hung from trees on the grounds of the Elisabet Ney Museum during Valentine's Day weekend. The installation of *Nancy Mims: The Passed Looms Present* marks the first time the Ney has participated in the Print Austin celebration of the city's print art community, according to Museum Director Oliver Franklin.

The panels are among thousands of flowers photographed by Mims with her cell phone during regular walks through the Hyde Park neighborhood. Her goal was to capture blooms throughout the year at their brief "moment of perfection." Using standard cellphone applications, she infused each photo with a dramatic dark background. A textile designer, Mims began sending the photos to her fabric printer "on a whim," with instructions to make them bigger. She hung the resulting panels on a wall, but they felt stagnant. She decided to move her work outside.



Mims explained, "for years I've wandered by the Ney and had visions of my art in the trees." She views the trees as her gallery walls and the wind as her collaborator, creating motion that brings the panels to life. As part of the installation, two large looms were constructed between trees and participants were invited to help reconstruct two of her photographs on a larger scale from fabric strips. Both weavings are on temporary exhibit on the Ney grounds north of Waller Creek, according to Oliver Franklin, who expressed enthusiasm for future outdoor art installations at our neighborhood museum.







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Hyde Park Contact Team Quarterly Meeting Minutes: Monday, January 25, 2016

Co-Chair, Jen Berbas, called the meeting to order.

Elections were held. The following candidates were nominated.

- Adrian Skinner and Kristen Remeza were nominated for co-Chair.
- Kathy Lawrence was nominated for Vice Chair.

These three were elected, 9 in favor and 1 abstention. There were no nominations from the floor for Secretary. The position will be elected at the next quarterly meeting in April. Mity Myhr agreed to serve until the next meeting. Thanks were extended to the previous co-Chairs, Adrian Skinner and Jen Berbas, and previous Vice Chair Lianna Mills for their service to the neighborhood.

Neighborhood Plan prioritizations were considered. The City of Austin requested that the Contact Team re-prioritize our development goals for the neighborhood. The City requested the top five Capital Improvement (CIP) items and the top five non-CIP items. The City asked that we not add any new items to the list submitted in 2000; therefore we identified items not already completed from the Neighborhood Plan.

Each CIP item was voted on individually, 11 in favor and 1 abstention.





The qualities they cited as responsible for the popularity of their top ten neighborhoods were access to public transit, affordability, and charm. Redfin based its choices on growth in page views and favorites on its website. The median sale price they cited for Hyde Park? \$449,000.

From the description of Hyde Park by one of their agents, "Hyde Park is a quiet, tree-lined neighborhood with a mix of modern and classic Craftsman homes that suit many types of buyers. It has always been a popular neighborhood, but it has become even more competitive over the last few years due to the revitalization of the surrounding area. Austin's community college system recently purchased a nearby vacant mall and has developed a portion of the complex into a new campus, and will develop the remaining portion into private mixed-use space. As a result, new eateries, retail shops, bars and public spaces are cropping up in the area. Hyde Park residents are a short distance from the action, and still have the benefit of their subdued neighborhood to come home to."

The occupancy limit policy was discussed. The CT debated supporting the occupancy limits as they are temporarily in place. Neighbors agreed that the smaller number of unrelated adults helps to prevent the demolition of smaller houses. The CT voted on the following resolution to be communicated to the city, 10 in favor and 1 opposed.

The Hyde Park Neighborhood Contact Team supports maintaining the current occupancy limit of four unrelated adults per single-family zoned properties.

The meeting was adjourned.

The next quarterly meeting of the Hyde Park Contact Team will be on April 25, 7:00-8:30 pm. All residents, renters or tenants, property owners, and business owners in Hyde Park are encouraged to become members of the Contact Team and participate in discussions. HPNA Minutes: February 1, 2016

Before the meeting convened, members enjoyed a potluck dinner and social time. The meeting was called to order at 7:32 pm by co-President Reid Long at the Griffin School, 5001 Evans Avenue.

The first agenda item consisted of brief presentations by the seven declared candidates for the State Representative District 49 vacancy left by the retirement of Elliott Naishtat.

- Gina Hinojosa, a civil-rights and labor lawyer and the immediate past president of the AISD School Board, emphasized her interest in public education. She opposes school vouchers and supports an opt-out for public universities on the campus-carry gun law.
- Huey Rey Fischer stressed his experience working for progressive Democrats in the legislature and stated his intent to promote a proactive agenda that includes healthcare expansion and LGBT rights.
- Aspen Dunaway, a trial attorney, detailed his neighborhood roots and declared that his primary interests were rebuilding the middle class through property tax and student loan debt relief and the expansion of health care funding.
- Heather Way, a UT law professor with experience in community advocacy, described her main interests as countering right-wing extremism in the legislature, reducing the influence of interest groups, and addressing the growing economic divide.
- Kent Johnson, who described his experience as prosecutor, judge, and attorney, emphasized the need to find solutions to growth in Austin, such as integrated transportation, flexible employment, and support for commercial ride-sharing options. He opposes the use of local tax dollars to support other school districts.
- Matt Shrum, a former prosecutor now in private practice as well as a small-business owner, declared his primary interests as fiscal responsibility, public safety, transportation improvement, and economic growth. If elected, he wants to serve on the House budget committee.
- Blake Rocap, a public interest lawyer, emphasized that
 his ten years of experience working with the legislature
 enhances his ability to pursue an agenda that includes
 cutting property taxes, protecting the rights of public
 employees, and expanding early childhood education.

The second agenda item was consideration of a resolution to support the request for a zoning variance for development of a congregate care facility at the Triangle complex on 45th Street. Jeff Howard, an attorney representing the developers, who provided details of the proposed project at the January meeting, returned to HPNA to report additional revisions to improve drainage in response to members' expressed opposition to reducing impervious cover that will exacerbate neighborhood flooding risks. Mr. Howard stated that the revisions included the addition to the proposed building of a holding tank that would enhance drainage capacity to the level of 80% impervious cover. The resolution published in the

February issue of the *Pecan Press* was read and discussed. Several members requested amendments to the resolution to include more specific language about the drainage issue. The amendments passed unanimously with a vote of 28 in favor. The amended resolution reads as follows:

The Hyde Park Neighborhood Association supports the request for The Village at The Triangle by W2 Real Estate Partners for a change in zoning and variance for impervious cover to build a congregate care facility on The Triangle property contingent upon the developers' maintaining runoff at an 80% impervious cover level and enhancing detention capacity to reduce the rate of discharge. This development represents a significant need in our community while using a smaller impervious cover footprint than other potential developments on the property.

The resolution passed by a vote of 26 in favor, 1 opposed, and 1 abstention.

The third agenda item was a resolution on occupancy limits. Discussion was brief and no amendments were proposed. The resolution reads as follows:

The Hyde Park Neighborhood Association (HPNA) supports maintaining the current occupancy limits of four unrelated adults in single-family zoned properties. The HPNA views the current occupancy limits as essential to maintaining affordable housing in the neighborhood because it removes the incentive to remove older, more affordable housing in favor of newer and more expensive housing stock. Furthermore, the current limit helps ensure that new housing stock is useful for all resident types rather than for a single segment of the residential population. Finally, the current occupancy limit of four unrelated adults has reduced incidents of excess trash, overflow street parking, noise disturbances, and the demolition of older homes.

The resolution passed with a vote of 22 in favor, 1 opposed, and 3 abstentions.

Announcements included concern about the movement of a perimeter fence at the UT Intramural Fields; it raised concerns about neighborhood access and excess water run-off. The upcoming Development Review Committee meeting agenda includes a proposed building project across from Baker School. Several upcoming Shipe Park activities include It's My Park Day (March 5) and a City Parks Department presentation on the new Shipe Pool design (March 23, Griffin School, 5:30 pm). Cap Metro provided handouts about its Smart Trips program to reduce traffic. Finally, a moment of silence honored recently deceased neighbors.

The meeting adjourned at 8:42 pm.

Even with him gone.



very busy, exciting place.


March will be a bit quieter, but there may be a surprise event and a very exciting art installation coming in, so keep your eyes on the Ney's Facebook page for more information!

I.Jay grabbed every opportunity he got to participate in theatre in college at Rice and here in Austin at Zach Scott, and there was nothing that he loved more than singing and dancing. If you saw I.Jay dance, then you saw I.Jay in his element. And, by the way, you saw a fabulous dancer.

More than anything, I.Jay loved his family. His newest role in life, being a grandfather, was his favorite, and to see him doting on his granddaughter, Emily, was to see a man in full. When Emily was present, I.Jay would be smiling. Emily sparked I.Jay to the last day of his life.

Many knew Carol as a fiber artist, a member of both the Knitters and Crocheters Guild of Central Texas and the Weavers and Spinners Guild. She published her patterns through her own company, Firewheel Designs. She was a regular at Pioneer Farms, where she dressed in pioneer costume and displayed for tourists such traditional crafts as spinning wool into yarn, and she was the spinning instructor at a fiber arts studio in Wimberley.

Her facility with language and linguistics was another thing for which she was known. Nobody could beat her at Boggle; she not only knew more words than anyone else, she knew their derivations as well. Her friends note in awe that she filled in crossword puzzles in ink.

Carol and her husband George moved into their Hyde Park home on Avenue F in 1972. According to George, "We knew from the beginning we were blest with an ideal home in Hyde Park." Their son Geoffrey, born a year later, grew up in Hyde Park and attended the Austin Montessori School on Duval. The Wyche household was known for its parties, particularly on April Fool's Day.

Add to all that an unflappable nature and a cheerful disposition, and it's easy to understand why Carol will be missed by her Hyde Park neighbors.
