TreeFolks to Revive Planting Program in Hyde Park

ood news, neighbors — Tree-JFolks has agreed to bring its "Neighborwoods" tree planting program back to Hyde Park!


At our August 3 HPNA meeting, Shannon Halley of TreeFolks, will outline the program that offers free young trees for planting along these streets, needed to replace the ones Monroe Shipe planted to create Hyde Park's "perfect shade" at the close of the 19th Century.

Drought conditions, as well as all the other threats facing our treasured urban forest here in Hyde Park, are taking a heavy toll this year, adding new urgency to the need to replant and restore our shade canopy for the future.

Ms. Halley, Associate Director of TreeFolks and member of the Urban Forestry Board, will also explain some new tools and volunteer opportunities available to those who are anxious to turn our concern about the welfare of our trees into meaningful action.

TreeFolks representatives will mark qualifying spots along

s I write this article, I am reflecting on how busy the neighbors in Hyde Park have been with neighborhood activities. The 2000 II. with neighborhood activities! The 2009 Homes Tour was a great success.

In addition, Hyde Park (south of 45th street) will be filing the Hyde Park Local Historic District application with the Historic Landmark Commission very soon. Both of these undertakings took a lot of work from dedicated neighbors and volunteers. Specifically, the LHD Design Guidelines were developed by a group of individuals who came forth with new ideas and insight along with a group that were strict preservationists. The end result is the proposed LHD Design Guidelines that will protect the fabric of the neighborhood but still will allow creativity in new construction.

Another accomplishment being pursued is the Hegman Subdivision Local Historic District in the North Hyde Park Area. The neighbors have drafted their particular Design Guidelines specific to the area and are gathering homeowner signatures. They too hope to be filing their application with the Historic Landmark Commission very soon.

Last but not least, a Caswell-Ridgetop Annex Local Historic District project, also in the North Hyde Park area, is starting. With city historic landmarked houses such as the Morrison-Smith House and the Worley House, this area will be recognized as a valuable and historic section of Hyde Park (north of 45th street). So with all these important tasks involving volunteers and their time in all corners of Hyde Park (North, South, East, and West!), I plan to propose to the Steering Committee to rethink the budget for the 2009 HPNA Christman Party. Lastly, I know this may not be politically correct due to water rationing, but if you can spare a little water, please water the trees in your area, as they are looking a little stressed! So let's all do a rain dance and have a good summer!

neighborhood streets for tree planting for the Neighborwoods program and leave an order form and information about the program with adjoining property owners.

Participating property owners fill out the form, select from a menu of tree species and must agree to plant and water the trees until they are established. The free trees are delivered at planting time, along with planting and care instructions.

The program is sponsored by Austin Energy as part of the city's Heat Island Initiative.

We can can also talk at the meeting about things we can do to help our existing trees survive, especially pruning, mulching and watering.



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


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House Flies

With the hot temperatures, house flies have been breeding and developing quickly causing them to become a problem in and around homes. House

flies can be more than just a nuisance when they spread diseases such as dysentery or food poisoning. Disease can be spread by the flies because they often feed and lay eggs on garbage, manure or carrion, and often get into



homes and land on food, countertops or other surfaces. House flies regurgitate onto food to liquefy it before eating and they can further contaminate items by defecating upon surfaces.


The common house fly has two wings, is dull gray with black stripes on the thorax (the section where the wings are attached). Eggs are usually laid on animal fecal material or garbage. Maggots, the immature stage of a fly, are small, white, carrot-shaped and legless.

The key to fly management is sanitation, or cleaning. Eliminate breeding sites by picking up animal waste at least once or twice a week; empty garbage cans regularly; clean garbage cans at least once a month with soapy water. Keep garbage cans located away from doors that lead into the home and make sure they have tight fitting lids.

Other items that can help reduce fly problems include keeping window screens in good repair; making sure doors and windows have a tight seal and weather stripping is in good condition and using fly swatters or sticky fly paper to get rid of adult flies.

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
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

aw enforcement officials have long understood Lhow integral healthy neighborhood schools are to ensuring vibrant and safe communities. Police officers who serve as school resource officers and mentors and who patrol around schools understand the direct relationship between healthy schools and safe neighborhoods. Closing schools as a strategy to improve academic performance could result in similar unintended consequences on communities as when community or retail centers are shuttered. A void is left where there used to be activity and energy.

Like so many others, I was caught off guard last month when the Texas Education Agency (TEA) announced Pearce Middle School would close due to unacceptable academic performance. The Texas Legislature had just provided TEA with additional flexibility to help keep schools open. Overall student test scores at Pearce had improved significantly even though eighth grade science scores were weaker than hoped. On June 10, TEA awarded Pearce a \$50,000 grant. Inexplicably less than a month later TEA Commissioner Robert Scott announced Pearce would close.

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

For years the overall academic performance of Pearce students has been unacceptable. No one suggests otherwise. Ninety-five percent of Pearce students are considered economically disadvantaged which compounds their challenges. Some community leaders have expressed their belief that AISD officials share some blame for the closure as a result of years of neglect and because of failure to provide the attention and resources that Pearce needed to remain viable.

While many people take issue with closing struggling schools, it has been understood that schools should only be closed as a very last resort. If the academic scores at Pearce had not measurably improved this school closure would probably not be so controversial. Pearce students, teachers and parents developed a plan to improve academic performance and for the last two years test scores increased significantly. One would have expected TEA and AISD to praise and embrace this progress while pledging to aggressively attack the weaker science scores. Instead, even with other options at his disposal and a contrary recommendation from staff, Commissioner Scott chose to give up on Pearce.

The Texas Education Agency should vacate this decision to close Pearce and instead challenge them to build on their progress. AISD officials should commit the necessary resources and enlist community partners to help ensure success. Academically underperforming Texas schools which demonstrate meaningful academic progress deserve to know they will be supported and assisted, not shuttered.

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Hyde Park, Texas, U.S.A.?

Dear Neighbors,

I would like to propose that Hyde Park should secede from the City of Austin and be incorporated as a separate city. Think about it. Hyde Park has clear boundaries, a diverse population with a common culture, a body of citizens already sufficiently organized (but working for free) to operate in complex and sophisticated ways on behalf of its residents, and a fire station, post office, gym, museum, local businesses, and both rental and owner-occupied housing. Decentralization of political power is the way that people take control of their government and way of life. Large political units generate large bureaucracies which tend to feed on themselves, ineffectively meeting the needs of the people, meanwhile wasting money while they generate "projects" that no one would buy or invest in, if they had known of the details. (think: light-rail system)

Before you write off this idea, consider: New York is already broken up into separate boroughs, with at least some decentralization. Los Angeles essentially contains within it many smaller cities—Santa Monica, Beverly Hills, and Culver City to name a few. These smaller cities thrive. Hollywood is only a neighborhood within LA (not a city), and I hear it is trying to secede. And after Katrina, some neighborhoods in New Orleans by themselves formed partnerships with businesses and other organizations, to re-build their way of life, while the city bureaucrats fiddled. This has led to a proposal that New Orleans break up into separate, individual cities, according to the neighborhoods that took on their challenges. (Forbes, April 9, 2007) Even in Austin, homeowner associations in the suburbs have taken over significant governance, enforcement, and service-provision.

But wait. Don't larger cities lead to economies of scale that result in better and cheaper services—because more people pool their money? I ask you: Have city services improved in Austin in the last 20 years, as population, taxes, and rates have gone up? Or have services become worse and more expensive?

As with vegetables and book stores, so with government: Local is better. Hyde Park would make a great small city.
