Toward a Blower-free Hyde Park


Hyde Park is fast becoming a blower-free neighborhood as more residents, businesses, apartment complexes, and churches become aware of the noise disturbance and air pollution caused by blower use. We are assembling a list of companies and individuals who will provide blower-free lawn care service (see below), and are asking for additional names to be added to this list for future publication.

From conversations with various lawn care experts, we learn that:

1. Leaf blowers are frequently not necessary for removing leaves from lawns because most mowers used by lawn service companies can either mulch the leaves, leaving them behind to benefit the soil, or can suction and bag the leaves as the grass is being mowed.

2. The vast majority of blower use is for mere cosmetic purposes. Many people have come to see the unnaturally pristine appearance of walkways, driveways, and curbs as undesireable. In any event, the cosmetic affect is very shortlived, usually lasting a matter of

hours. The leaves, dust, and blades of grass that naturally appear on outdoor surfaces will naturally blow back into place with the next breeze or with the normal pace of traffic.

3. Where leaf-mulching mowers will not be used to remove lawn leaves, rakes and brooms, although slightly more labor-intensive, have stood the test of time and can be as time-efficient as blowers. (Check out the favorable rake-and-broom study at <www.zapla.org/present/dwptest.html>.)

Here are some possibilities for contacting lawn care service providers who will provide blower-free service:

- 1. Many companies will provide the typical lawn care service, but will, if requested, refrain from providing the "blown-off" look to sidewalks, driveways, porches, etc. This should result in a price reduction, because paved and porch surfaces are left "as is."
- 2. Many service providers will provide raking (and sweeping, if requested), for an additional charge and/or on an hourly basis.
- 3. Some companies, if they do not provide raking service, will coordinate with the customer, allowing the customer to rake out flower beds and similar small areas, and deposit the leaves on the lawn. The company will then mow-and-mulch the lawn with blower-free equipment.

Following is a list of service providers I've contacted or have heard about who have indicated a willingness to provide blower-free service, who understand the concerns of Hyde Park residents on this issue, and/or who expressed an openness to customer concerns about blower use. If you are currently using a lawn care comapny, you may wish to start with them, asking what options are available, such as those above.

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
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Minutes of HPNA General Meeting January 5, 2009

It's My Park! Day": First on the agenda, Mark Fishman announced the Austin Parks Foundation's It's My Park! Day event at **Shipe Park**, **March 9**, **2009**. He'd like to have a co-chair for the event. Please contact him if you'd like to help with this annual park improvement initiative. (see related article beginning on page 1)

2009 HPNA Budget: Co-treasurer IJ Aarons presented the proposed 2009 budget for HPNA. The budget was prepared and approved by the Finance Committee (Alan Marburger, Nick Van Bavel, David Conner, and IJ Aarons with input from the Steering Committee. Members in attendance unanimously passed a motion to approve the 2009 budget as presented with a friendly amendment from the floor to revisit the line item relating to the Holiday Party in October in case funds are available to increase it to an amount closer to the funding for the last several years.

4312 Ave. G Historic Zoning: The status of this item was on the officially announced agenda, but it was removed from the agenda pending a mediation requested and managed by City Councilmember Randi Shade between property owners and HPNA-designated representatives . The tentative mediation sessions are scheduled in councilmember Shade's office on January 7 and January 14, 2009.


Tire Slashing: Because of the recent tire slashings and car window smashing in several areas of the neighborhood, some neighbors requested that HPNA request additional patrols from the Austin Police Department (APD). Some other ideas mentioned were security cameras, signs, and neighborhood patrols. Lisa Harris, HPNA's Austin Neighborhoods Council (ANC) Representative, said that ANC is organizing a Central Sector group of neighborhoods to work together to share information about various things including crime and safety. David Conner agreed to contact the HPNA APD representative for an update on efforts to curb these crimes. (Note: As we went to press, it appears that the APD had apprehended an individual who they strongly suspect is responsible for the recent rash of tire slashings.)

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

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
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
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ASH Invites Neighbors' Involvement and Support



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
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Eco-friendly shopping and delivery service launches in Austin

Fieldwork for the Hyde Park local historic district is proceeding. As of January 21, Preservation Central had finished documenting the Avenues from Duval to Speedway. Documenting the remainder of the Avenues and the numbered streets (which have far fewer houses) will require about two weeks to finish.

Once the fieldwork has been completed, Preservation Central has one task and we have another. Preservation Central will begin using the information collected during fieldwork to prepare the application. Our task is to enter that information into a database.

The database will be useful not only for preparing the inventory of houses for the local historic application but also in the future, any time we need to research something about the architecture in Hyde Park. Suppose, for example, we want to hold a Homes Tour consisting entirely of 1920s houses; we can search the database for houses built between 1920 and 1929.

This is an easy task; all you need to know is how to type. If you can donate a few hours or only an hour, get in touch with me. All time contributions, however small, add up to a large task completed.

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


