

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

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## Hyde Park Neighborhood Association General Meeting June 7, 2010

Eric Dusza from the City of Austin Public Works Department gave a presentation about the City's new Neighborhood Partnering Program (NPP).

The NPP was recently established to provide a mechanism to assist neighborhood groups in developing, resourcing and executing small- (under \$75,000) to medium-(\$75,001 to \$150,000) sized improvement projects in the city's right of way, or on city-owned property. It's also intended to provide assistance to neighborhood groups in identifying, qualifying and applying for various federal, state, and/or private funding opportunities. The NPP consists of two funding subprograms: the **Neighborhood** Cost Share Program (NCSP) and the Grant Assistance Program (GAP). Applicants will share in the cost of the project with a minimum of 40% of small projects and 25% of the total project cost. The cost sharing can come from cash contributions, market value of in-kind services, or a reasonable estimate of donated labor ("sweat equity"). Funding for the NPP will come from the city's Public Works budget, or if it's park-related it will come from the city's Parks and Recreation Department budget. It offers an opportunity for neighborhood groups to instigate projects such as traffic calming, sidewalks, pocket parks, bicycle lanes, curbs and gutters, and tree planting. Detailed information on the program, the guidelines and application process are available at <www.ci.austin. tx.us/publicworks/downloads/npp\_program\_document2.pdf>. Notice of Intent applications are being accepted now, the review process will start in July. Mr. Dusza's presentation was followed by Q&A.

Next, Travis County Commissioner Sarah Eckhardt talked about ideas for improving tax appraisals. She noted that with regard to state and local tax burden as a percentage of income, Texas does pretty well compared to other states. Texas ranks 43rd among the states with regard to tax burden as a percentage of income. The overall tax burden as a percentage of income is hovering at about 8.4% as opposed to the national average of around 9.8%. She said that when you consider our heavy reliance on property taxes, her concern is also for the flip side of that page showing that 37% of Travis county residents are cost burdened and paying more than 30% of their income for housing. She suggested that we might inject progressivity into our property tax schemes. Taxing entities have some tools for progressivity such as the homestead exemption, the over 65 and the disabled


exemptions, the agricultural exemptions and various other tools. Since the Travis Central Appraisal District is completely independent of taxing entities, she thinks that exemptions are where performance can be improved more than appraisal. Some of her specific ideas for improvements are: 1) The City of Austin could add a homestead exemption (presently, Travis County has that exemption, but the city does not); 2) Taxing entities should look at indexing over-65 and homestead exemptions the way they work now, they are not sensitive at all to income; 3) Create a "circuit-breaker" clause where if you can prove you are burdened over a certain percentage of your income by property tax, you'd qualify for a rebate; 4) Create land bank districts to try to help people who can no longer afford their homes because of property taxes. In these districts you'd pay tax on the home value, but not land value. In conclusion, her presentation included some data and many ideas to get a discussion started about reviewing property tax valuation in this area.

Next was an announcement by Avenue B resident Mity Myhr Clay that she and neighbor Robert James will be on the Citizen Communication portion of City Council agenda on Thursday, June 10 to ask for correct enforcement of the North Hyde Park NCCD. A local developer is planning to construct a duplex at **4605 Avenue B**. The duplex (3 bedrooms, 2 1/2 baths each side) violates the North Hyde Park NCCD for parking, driveways and carports. The NCCD does not permit driveways and carports on the front of the house. The city reviewers permitted the plans despite these problems. Neighbors' efforts to stop the construction have, at the time of this meeting, been unsuccessful. In addition to the issue at 4605 Ave. B, the neighbors are concerned that future enforcement of the NCCD will be more difficult if this project isn't enforced.

HPNA President David Conner then announced that the Steering Committee has conditionally agreed with a current proposal by Don Adam of Rehab Care and Allan Brown of Prevarian Hospital Partners for a **rehabilitation hospital**. It is proposed for the northwest corner of the **Triangle project** just west of the drainage detention area (along 45th between Lamar and Guadalupe). His next announcement was that Preservation Central has completed the initial survey for the Caswell/Ridgetop area and has delivered the report. Neighbors will review the report and hopefully initiate a Local Historic District project in the near future.

The meeting at our temporary meeting place, Austin Groups for the Elderly, was adjourned with plenty of daylight left.

Out of concern that the process is legally airtight, the city has scheduled a meeting to enable people who live in the proposed district the opportunity to suggest input into the Design Standards we finalized approximately a year ago. By the time you read this column, the meeting will already have taken place, but everyone who lives in the proposed district will have been notified by the city in plenty of time to be able to attend.

It doesn't end there. If things proceed as we hope, the Hyde Park Local Historic District will be on the July agenda of the Historic Landmark Commission. Because each month's agenda is only assembled after the previous month's meeting, we don't know for sure, but you can access the agenda by going to <www.ci.austin.tx.us/cityclerk/bc\_info\_center.htm>, selecting Historic Landmark Commission from the list, and then selecting the correct agenda. I will also post our appearance on the Hyde Park Notice list. Come to support your Hyde Park Local Historic District.


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




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## Long-Time Hyde Parkers Celebrate 50th Anniversary
