
Neighbors, HPNA, PARD, Austin Energy, and Austin Parks Foundation Work Together to Improve Shipe Park

These have come about through the efforts of neighbors working closely with the City of Austin and the Austin Parks Foundation to address several long-term needs of the park. As a result, we will be assured of continued enjoyment of Shipe for years to come.

It's My Park! Day: Hyde Park neighbors have participated in an annual spring work day at Shipe Park as part of the city-wide It's My Park! Day sponsored by the Austin Parks Foundation. Homes Tour Si, Graffiti No!



New Trees For Shipe: In spring 2008, over 20 trees were planted at Shipe. This project was funded by Austin Energy "mitigation" funds (to mitigate the impact of installation of power poles in the neighborhood.) Neighbor Jill Nokes worked with Judy Fowler of Austin Energy to select and site appropriate trees for the park. To ensure the survival of the trees, the project included putting all of them on an irrigation system. This foresighted effort will ensure that, when and if our beloved older trees pass on, we will have a new generation of trees for Shipe users to enjoy.

Sprinkler System for Playing Field and Pool: Despite annual fertilizing and re-seeding of the playing field area of the park, heavy use and drought conditions have turned the field to bare dirt and dust by the end of each summer. So this year at It's My Park Day, several volunteers proposed a solution: put in a sprinkler system. Neighbor Jack Nokes took on this project. He asked the Hyde Park Neighborhood Association to fund up to half of the estimated \$3,600 cost, and he agreed to raise the rest from neighbors. Within a week, 23 generous Hyde Park neighbors (see list, below) had pledged the remaining amount. During this process the idea was put forward to extend this project to cover the large swimming pool area as well. Neighbor Nick van Bavel offered a matching grant for the pool project, and within another week eight more neighbors put up the remainder. Our friends at the Austin Parks Foundation agreed to provide financial oversight of the project, and PARD will own, operate, and provide water for the system.

Retaining Wall for the Large Pool. This spring a hard-working PARD crew built a retaining wall at the northwest corner of the large pool at Shipe. This improvement not only will address an erosion problem, but it

has also created a level area for sun-bathing on those hot summer days. With the addition of new sod, and the assurance of regular watering of the grass around the pool, the Shipe Pool experience will continue to improve.

Partnerships Work. The recent improvements to Shipe Park are a reminder of the power of partnerships. When neighbors work together with PARD, the Austin Parks Foundation, Austin Energy, and HPNA, we all have a greater sense of ownership, accountability, and pride. The success of collaborative projects, such as ones at Shipe and Sparky Park, shows that neighbors who care about the quality of life in Hyde Park can make a real difference.



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Hyde Park Scout Completes Conservation Project at the **Elizabet Ney Museum**

Tyde Parker Nick Johns, a Boy Scout in Hyde Park-**■** based Troop 459, has completed a required project for his Eagle Scout award. Nick's project also makes

him eligible for the William T. Hornaday Conservation Badge, a very prestigious award, earned by Scouts who complete a certain group of conservation-related Merit Badges (including Soil and Water Conser-

vation, Forestry, Environmental Science, Gardening, Landscape Architecture and others) and complete a significant conservation project. Nick, working with the staff at the Elisabet Ney Museum and the City of Austin Parks and Recreation Department, planned and completed an invasive species removal project along Waller Creek between the bridge at Avenue F and the old dam on the Creek. This project is one of the first phases of a landscape restoration project being conducted at the Ney Museum, with the ultimate goal of returning the landscape to the prairie conditions that existed in the early twentieth century when Ms. Ney was in residence.

Nick, scouts and adults from Troop 459, friends, neighbors and family invested over 140 hours on three weekends working on the project. In early March, Nick identified poison ivy along the creek, and working with City Parks and Recreation crews, covered several areas of pre-emergent poison ivy with six-mil black plastic (spraying herbicide along the creek was not an option). With most of the poison ivy covered, city crews operated chain saws to cut overgrown "junk" vegetation along the creek, which the boys hauled to the edge of Avenue F for removal and disposal. In total, several hundred cubic yards of unwanted vegetation and trash was removed, exposing several old hardwood trees and opening the otherwise overgrown creek corridor. According the Ney Museum staff, this project had the unintended benefit of making this portion of the creek a little less welcome to the homeless persons who appear to have frequented the area.

Nick Johns grew up in Hyde Park, attended Lee Elementary, Kealing Magnet School, learned to swim in Shipe Pool, and is currently a Senior at the Liberal Arts and Sciences Academy at LBJ High School. He will attend Austin College in Sherman, Texas in the fall, and is considering majoring in Environmental Science.



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
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Around & About the Avenues

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
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
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HPNA May 2009 Meeting Minutes

At 7 p.m. on Monday, May 4th, at the Hyde Park Methodist Church, HPNA President David Conner began the meeting.

First on the agenda was Mark Fishman, speaking on behalf of Jack Nokes, to discuss the **irrigation system for Shipe Park**. Mark mentioned that over \$1,000 had already been raised in private donations, and that the maximum needed was \$3,000 (see related update in this issue). HPNA will match the private donations, so we are really close to meeting the funding needs. If you would like to make a private donation, you can do so by going to <www.austinparks.org/member.html>. From there, go to the section that reads, "Gifts to Special Funds," pull down the menu and highlight "Shipe Park Sprinklers," and then click on the button that reads "Give Special Fund Gift Now."

Next, Chris Riley, candidate for City Council Place #1, addressed the group. He introduced himself, reminded everyone to go out and vote in the upcoming local elections, and discussed his support for many of the programs that the HPNA supports, such as the formation of the Local Historic District and the Tree Preservation Program.

Next, Mike Robbins spoke about his experiences over the years protesting his property taxes at the **Travis County Appraisal District (TCAD)**. Some suggestions he had were to try to fight the improvement value of your property by comparing it to other properties in the area in terms of class and grade of construction. He mentioned that photographs are helpful in this argument, and encouraged folks to ask for comps of other properties by calling and requesting them directly from TCAD.

Finally, Niyanta Spelman, former HPNA Co-President and current Executive Director of Rainforest **Partnership**, gave a presentation on rainforest protection and the problems with deforestation around the world. The goal of their organization is to identify threats to forests around the world, to create sustainable economic alternatives to deforestation, and to raise awareness of the issue. One of the facts that Niyanta pointed out was that 20-25% of greenhouse gas emissions comes from deforestation. As a comparison, all carbon emissions from transportation around the world represent less than the amount from deforestation. In concluding, Niyanta explained that she was a part of this organization because she thinks it is important to explain the role that rainforests play in climate change, that choices we all make for our lifestyles all around the world matter, and that we need to start treating rainforests as if they are our own backyard. She ended with this quote: "What happens there affects us all everywhere." 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


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Grow Your Own Food... here's an ambitious new opportunity in Austin!

Many neighbors may already know Austin Green Art (AGA - <www.austingreenart.org>) for its Earth Day events, for its presence at SXSW, and/or for its community efforts expanding the notion of public engagement about the environment through creativity. Well, now AGA is further expanding its scope of work to include interesting new initiatives that foster the development of home gardens. Read on:

1) Want to plant a garden, but need assistance? AGA's new local business, Green Collar, has started a service called Resolution Gardens. Their motto is "Grow food. We'll help." http://www.resolution-gardens.com They have gotten off to an ambitious start, building a garden a week since mid-March, including a large garden at St. Edwards University.

2) Instead of paying to grow grass, GET PAID to grow food! Wheatsville Food Co-op envisions a decentralized urban food grid, where neighbors provide produce for each other, and for restaurants and groceries — the Wheatsville Gro-op! If 1% of Austinians are over-producing a basket of tomatoes with their home gardens, that's 10,000 bushels! A North University neighbor is donating the installation of a 1800 square foot garden in his backyard. The garden maintenance will be funded by Wheatsville and they will harvest all the produce for their deli operation. This is the first pilot Wheatsville YardFarm. Become a member at <www.wheatsville.coop/gro-op.html> You can donate time, money, talents, a garden plot, and/or a yard to build this endeavor -- the site will tell you how.

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The Local Historic District Corner

As I write this, the Bradford-Nohra house at 43rd and Avenue G stands in imminent danger of demolition. Despite the work of many people to research it, document it, negotiate over it, and work to preserve it, and despite the fact that both the Historic Landmark Commission and the City Council (on first reading) voted unanimously for it to become a historic landmark, the permit has been issued. Why? Because of a supposed error on the part of the City, "discovered" by the city attorneys a few days before the house's final historic determination.

Does this sound familiar? It should. The same thing happened about a year ago, when the Gertrude Jones house, which also was on the path to historic landmark status, was demolished because of an error on the part of the City. That lot is now empty. We don't know yet what will replace the Gertrude Jones house; we believe that the Bradford-Nohra house will be replaced by a four-plex if it's demolished. Is that what we want occupying an important corner lot? Or do we want a vintage home, restored and housing a Hyde Park family?

Two houses, on their way to historic zoning, sabotaged by a city error. One thing these two cases makes abundantly clear is the lack of support by the City of Austin for historic preservation. The second thing these cases make clear is the need for a local historic district, with its protection of not just historic landmarks but contributing structures. In the area we're proposing for a local historic district, 70 to 75% of the structures are contributing.

We're moving into the home stretch. Our neighborhood survey has been done. After a year and a half of work, we have design guidelines. Preservation Central is working on the remaining paperwork for our nomination, and our online database of historic data will soon be up and running.

At the June HPNA meeting, there will be a presentation about the local historic district.

That same presentation will be online. During the next two months, someone who lives close to you will invite you to a block gathering to talk to you about the benefits of creating a local historic district. Bring your questions. If your neighbor can't answer them, she or he will bring them to me and I'll track down the answers. We need your support so that we don't lose another Gertrude Jones or Bradford-Nohra house.

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
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Live years ago, we took advantage of Austin Energy's rebate program to install a 3 KW PhotoVoltaic System on the roof of our home. Rebates for PV systems at that time were around 80% of the installed price. The 3 KW system, installed by Texas Solar Power Company, cost a little over \$18,000, including installation and sales tax. After the rebate, our out-of-pocket expense was a little over \$4000. The system went "online" in February, 2005 and has been steadily cranking out power from the sun; over 13 MegaWatt Hours since it was installed. The system reduced our monthly electric bill by roughly half during the non-air-conditioning months (from the mid \$50 range to the mid \$20 range).

As a part of a current remodel project on our garage apartment, we installed another 3 KW system, which went active in January of this year. So far this year, we have paid less than \$4.00 for electricity to Austin Energy. In fact, our April bill was \$0 for electricity – 0 KWHr usage (there is a \$6.00 customer charge by Austin Energy that you pay whether you use any electricity or not.)

Both of the systems are "grid-tie" systems, which means that they return power to the grid – turning the meter backwards - whenever your usage is less than the PV system is producing.

The rebate from Austin Energy has fallen to around 50% of the installed cost, but there is a federal tax credit that we will receive on our 2008 federal tax bill that will bump it up close to the 80% range again. So, for less than the price of a fairly modest used car, "energy independence" is a step closer to reality in Austin – thanks to a very progressive utility company and a finally-getting-the-message federal government.

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

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
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
