

# Minutes of the April 2009 HPNA General Meeting

The first speaker was the hopeful proprietor of **Atticus Cocoa** Lounge, who announced her intention to open at the former site of Dodd's Auto Repair (43rd & Guadalupe). She came bearing chocolate samples (that will be available at her business) to share while she let the neighbors in attendance know about the new business. If she leases the space, it will require a use change from automotive to food use. She intends the business to be 50% retail and to sell chocolates, baked items, espresso, espresso drinks and wine. She won't be selling alcohol that will leave the premises. She took questions about the planned business.

Moses Rodriguez, Code Enforcement Officer from the City of Austin Solid Waste Services
Department spoke next. He talked about the variety of issues that code enforcement officers within the city handle and take questions from neighbors. According to



## The Local Historic District Corner

#### Thank You!

This column is a Thank You to all those people who have been involved in the creation of our Local Historic District Design Standards.

I know of no other neighborhood seeking a Local Historic District in Austin that has spent the time on its design standards that we have here in Hyde Park. First there was a year of monthly meetings, during which a regular group of 5 or 6 people (and many occasional participants) discussed and debated design issues. That was followed by a review and revision conducted under the guidance of a historic preservation consultant. Finally, there has been a discussion of those revisions by members of the Steering Committee, the Development Review Committee, and the original design standards subcommittee.

Every neighborhood in Austin working on a Local Historic District is facing the same challenges - balancing the preservation of the historic with the need to allow for change and adaptation to a contemporary lifestyle and balancing the freedom of owners with the concerns of their neighbors. Most haven't begun the process. One neighborhood, in fact, is waiting for us to finish ours before they begin. There have been numerous calls for the city to produce a

set of boilerplate standards that can be applied, with some modifications, to all historic Austin. One radical suggestion was that standards should not be a requirement at all; let the Historic Landmark Commission make all the decisions. These standards, however, provide us with a unique opportunity: to guarantee that our neighborhood does not lose the look and feel that we all cherish.

As you read over the latest version of the Design Guidelines, soon to be posted to our HPNA website, keep in mind that these were hammered out during incalculable hours of blood, sweat, and tears. Every paragraph, sentence, and word was subject to debate, modification, and deletion, during not one but two rounds of writing, editing, and revision. The conversation began with one group of people and expanded outward to several additional groups of people. Soon, it will expand to the entire neighborhood. We welcome your feedback.

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

## **April Meeting Minutes...**

Moses, the number of City of Austin code enforcement officers has gone from 4 to 42 enforcement officers in the last 3 years with an eventual size of 100 enforcement officers. They handle issues including missing permits, abandoned houses, and property liens. Neighbors present asked a variety of questions, such as what to do when you see graffiti and current city regulations regarding how many unrelated individuals can live in a single family home with a secondary residence on the lot or in a duplex. He explained that the code enforcement officers handle land use violations including dangerous conditions on commercial properties and substandard and dangerous conditions on residential properties. He said that 311 is an effective way to report suspected code violations.

District Police Representative Kelly LaHood spoke next. She announced that due to reorganization, she is no longer the representative for Hyde Park. Hyde Park's new District Representative is Officer Dana Munguia, who was unable to attend the meeting. Officer LaHood gave an update on the integration of parks police with the Austin Police Department (APD). She announced that burglaries are up everywhere in Austin -both homes and vehicles. She also confirmed that APD caught someone in the act of poking a tire. He's been in jail for a month and a half. She finished by taking questions from neighbors.

The last speaker of the evening was neighbor Kent Rosivi, representing the group of neighbors who are proposing a **Rowena/ Hegman historic district**. The proposed district will be Avenue F and Rowena from 47th St. to 51st St. He explained that the Austin Historic Preservation office in February concluded that 63 of the houses in this area are preliminarily

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

contributing to a possible local historic district (requirements are that they must be 50+ years old and not significantly changed in style from the original construction). He reported that 30% of the neighbors who live in the proposed area are currently in favor of the district- the group is communicating with others in the area that have not been contacted as current regulations require that 60% of property owners be in favor of a local historic district. The group is starting to work on design standards and a preservation plan for the area. They have requested and received a bid from Preservation Central (a firm that is currently consulting with the Hyde Park Local Historic District Committee) to perform the survey work required. Mr. Rosivi then asked HPNA for \$1920 to retain Preservation Central on behalf of the Rowena/Hegman LHD group. Lorre Weidlich moved support and Catherine Moore seconded with an amendment to the motion to approve \$1920 for Preservation Central for photographic and physical documentation, and that HPNA approve the necessary budget amendment in amount of \$1920 in support of the effort. The motion passed unanimously. Meeting adjourned!

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
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
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# The penultimate floodlines 2009: Sun shines again on Hyde Park!



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


# Teens of Hyde Park Baptist Church Give Their All

It makes me want to have little kids again, just so to could be a part of this event," said Hyde Park resident, Carol Burton, about LeeLive!, a live concert and auction at La Zona Rosa benefiting Robert E. Lee Elementary. Despite having adult children and grand-kids now, Carol joined close to 500 hundred people from Hyde Park and nearby neighborhoods to support the public elementary school that has served the area since 1939.

Dancing to the voices and guitars of Kelly Willis and Bruce Robison, guests dined on County Line BBQ and pasta from Cannoli Joe's. Later in the night, the silent auction went live as parents and neighbors got into spirited bidding wars on items ranging from student made art, fine jewelry and professional construction services.

A goal of the event was to raise funds for the K-6th grade elementary school. Perhaps more importantly, organizers sought to foster community spirit. "We wanted to create a fun night when parents and teachers could get to know one another and when the larger community could connect to the school," said parent Laura Selis, the event's chair.

The response from the surrounding community was overwhelming. Several business leaders from the neighborhood demonstrated support by providing contributions and attending the event. Hyde Park Bar & Grill, Vino Vino, Fresh Plus, The Woodburn House, Mod Green Pod and Yost Automotive were some of the locally grown businesses to become sponsors. The developers of the Concordia property, East Avenue; Steve Vinklarek of State Farm Insurance; Grande Communications, Wells Fargo and National Instruments were key national corporate donors.

"Lee Elementary is a true asset to this neighborhood," said Carol Kim, a parent of a kindergartener and second grader. "This community clearly recognizes that when the neighborhood school flourishes, the surrounding neighborhood benefits as well."

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

# Crime Report



ummer is just around the corner, which means Omore outdoor activity including yard work and biking. Many of you will be taking trips too, so I wanted to pass on a friendly reminder to lock your homes, autos, windows and storage areas. Crime of opportunity is still the number one contributing factor in personal property theft.

In addition to the reminder to lock up your belongings, I have a few items to report. Over the past few months, I have attended a breakfast meeting of the Central Austin Neighborhood Council to discuss issues that affect quality of life. Carol Jackson and Lisa Harris have also attended representing Hyde Park. Other neighborhoods face the same crime and safety concerns that we do, such as transients in their parks and property theft. City Council member Laura Morrison attended the meeting on April 7th and listened to our concerns. Due to budget cuts, the police department is reorganizing and has cancelled its new cadet training academy, which causes great concern for some that there will be a shortage of new officers to replace those who will retire. Ms. Morrison did say that some of the cuts are still under review, so if you have some input that you would like to pass on, I would encourage you to speak up. Lisa Harris attended the Central West Commander's Forum on April 7th and reported that the main topic was the reorganization of APD. The North, Northwest and Downtown commands have been combined into the North Bureau. The boundaries are Town Lake, IH-35, Research and Hwy. 620. The idea behind creating a bureau is to improve response time, enhance communication within the bureau and have the ability to shift resources within the bureau to where they are needed most. The entire city is covered with three bureaus.

With the reorganization, Hyde Park has a new District Representative. Her name is Officer Dana Munguia. She has been in the Central West District for some time and is very familiar with our issues. If you wish to contact Officer Munguia, her phone number is 974-5440. I want to personally thank Officer Kelly LaHood for her willingness to attend Neighborhood Watch and HPNA meetings and to pass on important information and answer questions. Kelly is very passionate about making our parks and public places safer, and has led an effort within APD and the Austin Parks & Recreation Department to ensure that laws are enforced.

Neighborhood residents are becoming more alert and more willing to call the police when a crime has been committed. Several arrests have been made over the past couple of months, hopefully resulting in a reduction in property theft. If you had a theft recently, you are encouraged to contact APD to see if your belongings were recovered.





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


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# Hyde Park Poets



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




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# Hyde Park Poets






# Parents' Night Out

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




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
