A Red-Letter Day in the History of Hyde Park!


On Monday, April 12, 2010, HPNA President David Conner delivered the final Hyde Park Local Historic District Nomination to the City of Austin Historic Preservation Office.

Signed support forms from several major commercial property owners - the post office building and its across-the-street parking lot, the Fresh Plus building, the Hyde Park Bar & Grill building, and the Hyde Park Bar & Grill parking lot - pushed us up to the necessary level of support.

Update: Owl the News That's Fit to Print

There is good news to report in the wake of last month's *Pecan Press* article about the eastern screech owl that spent February in a pine tree on Avenue F. Turns out that a male screech owl persuaded her to move into his nest box located in a pecan tree on Avenue G. By the time the April issue of

the *Pecan Press* was actually delivered, there were already five eggs in the nest box.

During the night of April 7th it became apparent that something dramatic was happening, because normal nightly food deliveries the male made to the female (who now was spending her nights in the nest box incubating the eggs) increased from about 7 to 17! On the morning of April 8th three fluffy owlets were visible in the nest box eagerly demanding food. Two of the eggs did not hatch.

So what's a day like for screech owls with young owlets? During the day the male hides in a tree near the nest box and the female tends to the owlets (sometimes, to be frank, appearing to be bored). But once the sun goes down the female escapes the nest box for thirty minutes or so of free

time and the male gets serious about hunting. Even the female joins in hunting for brief periods of time between spending time with the owlets. Food deliveries so far to the nest box have included moths (both small and large), dragonflies, lizards, mice, a small snake, and sometimes a bird that is stored for daytime food for the owlets.

If you want to see screech owlets during the nesting season--which is going on in April and May in Austin--there are two live web cams in Austin that stream live video or updated photographs of life in the nest box. As of April 20th, the female owls in both of these web cam nest boxes were

From the President's Desk: Of Lawns and Chemicals

Last summer, even in the drought, I was able to keep my St. Augustine grass thick and green by using fertilizers, pesticides, and "weed and feed" regimes. I was looking forward to this spring with a thicker lawn. It did not happen. After the last cold spell, I noticed all the grass turned into hay down to the roots. Currently, there are a few new shoots

showing in patches, but the damage was done. I decided not to replant and will just let nature take over. I did sprinkle a little grass seeds just to see what happens.

I asked myself what went wrong? Was it a grass disease or did the snow kill it? After doing a little research, I found out I was definitely not a "Green Grower".

The City of Austin has information available on pesticides and fertilizers related to lawns. The website is <www.cityofaustin.org/ growgreen/data.htm> . It is noted that "weed and feeds" products combine both fertilizer and weed killer and are not environmentallysound for several reasons. It is also noted that the best time to fertilize is not the best time to use a weed killer. Any chemical that is not absorbed by the targeted weed stays unused on the turf and will wash off during rain to Austin's creeks or filter into the groundwater. What scared me is that the weed-killing chemical can find its way indoors on shoes and hands and by my dog's paws.

The city suggests purchasing a straight fertilizer (organics are a good alternative) and then handpulling or spot-treating weeds instead (I did this last week - lots of exercise!) .

The city also recommends that if you use a lawn care professional for yard maintenance, please ask your service provider to treat weed problems only when they are visible and then make sure the chemical isn't over-applied.

- Is there an adjustable-height or hand-held shower head?
- Are kitchen cabinets and cupboards accessible and easy to open?
- Is there ample light in all areas of the home?
- Are rugs or carpets secured to floor?
- In the kitchen, is a fire extinguisher within easy reach?

If you start identifying and planning for improvements now, you'll have a better chance of staying in your home as long as you'd like and enjoying the comfort and safety of your surroundings.



Trinity United Methodist Church to Hyde Park: Howdy Neighbors, and Here We Come!

Dear Neighbors,

We are all very sad about the dissolution of Hyde Park UMC, and wish everyone there the very best. Trinity UMC has voted to move into the space after HPUMC closes on May 31st. We are currently located in the northern part of Hyde Park (50th and Evans) and have been struggling for years because our space has been too small for our vibrant congregation. Please be assured that we have no desire to be a mega-church, but are simply very aware that our current space of 8,500 sq ft is too small for our congregation. Hyde Park's building is three times the square footage of our current space. We will be moving into 4001 Speedway after some renovations are done on the interior. Trinity plans to make improvements to the interior over the summer, which will include providing space for Hope Food Pantry; the elementary school which now rents from us, AHB (Austin Home Base); renovating children's and youth meeting spaces; and making the building more ADA accessible (installing an elevator, 2 new new ADA restrooms, etc.). We are just launching our capital campaign to raise the money to make these improvements.

Trinity is a 400-member church with an average of 200 on Sundays in worship and is Austin's only Reconciling United Methodist Church, meaning that we have taken a public stand welcoming and affirming lesbians, gays, bisexuals, and transgendered individuals Trinity was originally a mission church out of Shettle's (Hyde Park UMC) in the mid-40s to help establish a Methodist presence in the Ridgetop area. Of course, Ridgetop is now a part of Hyde Park. We have a strong children's and youth program and are very excited about the opportunity we've been given, even as we're also sad for the congregation members of Hyde Park UMC. Trinity's current space is on the market and we have an offer from a local private and progressive high school whose values and vision are consistent with the neighborhood. We are hoping this all works out. My vision is that Trinity will be a 7-day and 7-night a week community church for the Hyde Park Neighborhood and central Austin, continuing to be a crossroads of progressive spirituality and social activism but at a more central location than our current space on 50th Street. then City Council.

Now begins the public part of the process. The City of Austin will perform its necessary checks and calculations and then schedule a public hearing by the Historic Landmark Commission. Everyone within the boundaries of the proposed district and up to 500 feet outside of those boundaries will receive a notification of the date of the public hearing. At the hearing, speakers both for and against the district will have the opportunity to address the Commission. After the Historic Landmark Commission makes its decision, our nomination will go on to public hearings at the Planning Board and





HPNA Meeting Minutes, April 2010

The April 2010 HPNA meeting opened **▲** with Hyde Park resident Shelley Adair's presentation about a non-profit organization she helped form, **Austin Speech Labs**. Their mission is to reduce the impact of stroke on language and cognitive functions for stroke survivors. She gave an overview of the philosophy and services of the organization that assists uninsured and underinsured stroke victims recover from the effects of their stroke with "boot camp" type therapy. Intensive speech, language and cognitive therapy is provided. Only one other program like this currently exists in the U.S. The programs are growing in participants and in scope. Patrick Brown, Chief Appraiser for the **Travis** County Appraisal District (TCAD) was the next speaker. He began by an overview of the tax calendar for Travis County. The valuation process starts in late fall. Property values are appraised January 1 of each year and from that date until late April, TCAD completes appraisals and processes applications for exemptions. The notices of appraised value are expected to be mailed April 26, 2010 and property owners have until May 31 (or 30 days after the valuation was mailed, whichever is later) to file a protest with the Appraisal Review Board. The appraisal roll will be certified July 25. Patrick gave examples of how the appraisals are calculated based on land value, improvement value, and market adjustments. A property owner can protest on the basis of equity < that the property is not appraised the same as similar properties in the surrounding area, or value < that the property would not sell for the market value price. When a property owner protests, both an informal hearing and a formal hearing one week after the informal hearing will be scheduled. Last year 93000 properties in Travis County were protested.Mr. Brown stated that the property values may actually decrease an average of 3-4% in Travis County this year. Because of the big increases in value the past number of years in this area, even if an individual property does decrease in value, the property owner may not see a decrease in property tax due to homestead caps. He also mentioned that the Hyde

Park area is a difficult area to assess because so many different styles and ages of homes exist; it's harder to find comparable houses. If you request a hearing you may request the information on the similar properties used in the appraisal of your home for both market value and equity. You may also request the appraisal field manual with information about class and grade definitions used by appraisers. Mr. Brown then took questions from the neighbors in attendance. TCAD offices are at 8314 Cross Park Drive in Austin in the Walnut Creek Business Park. The website <www. traviscad.org > has the property roll and detailed information on valuation, laws, tax calendar, forms

HPNA President David Conner then took the floor for announcements and updates. The annual Hyde Park Homes Tour will be held Father's Day weekend, June 19 and 20. At this time, Tour chair Barbara Gibson has four homes confirmed and is working on four other possibilities. David closed the meeting by announcing that this was the last meeting at the Hyde Park United Methodist Church. The May meeting of HPNA will be held in the cafeteria at the Austin Groups for the Elderly building at the corner of West 38th and Cedar Street (3710 Cedar Street).

"War on Drugs": We are Losing

Former president Richard Nixon first used the term "war on drugs" 40 years ago when he declared drug use in America to be a "national emergency." In 1969, while just 15% of Americans said that they knew someone who had used drugs, drug use was on the rise and a significant percent of U.S. soldiers were becoming addicted to marijuana, heroin and other narcotics. In launching the war on drugs Nixon said, "If we cannot destroy the drug menace in America, then surely it will destroy us." That year the federal government appropriated about \$65 million for the war on drugs and just under 200,000 people were arrested for drug offenses.

In 2008 federal, state and local governments spent in excess of \$50 billion for direct costs of the war on drugs and about 1.7 million people were arrested for drug offenses. According to the FBI, an American is now arrested for drug possession every 18 seconds. More than half of the 2.3 million people incarcerated in the United States are serving time for drug offenses, most for possession. Much has also been written about the permanent underclass which has been created by the war on drugs that consists of tens of millions of people with criminal drug records who are no longer eligible for some government services, have trouble getting jobs, finding housing or even staying clean.

In addition to the money spent at home, the U.S. government also spends billions funding foreign wars to destroy poppy crops in Columbia, Guatemala, Panama, Ecuador, Afghanistan, Mexico and other countries. About 80% of drugs bound for the U.S. come through Mexico. And now the battle for control of the highly lucrative Mexican drugs cartels is spilling over into Texas and other southern states. We have learned that it is not easy, cheap or even possible to effectively eradicate crops or significantly restrict the transportation of drugs - even from the friendliest of countries.



For 40 years law enforcement officers have arrested and incarcerated millions of people for possession and trafficking of drugs, implemented "Just Say No", DARE and other anti-drug programs, interdicted millions of tons of drugs and destroyed millions of acres of poppy crops in dozens of countries. Yet after spending about a trillion dollars to "destroy the drug menace" U.S. citizens now consume about two-thirds of the world's illegal drugs. The drug war has inflicted heavy casualties on American, Mexican and other citizens. It has created a lucrative cottage industry of gangs, drug cartels and terrorist organizations, and has adversely affected our national priorities, economy and national security interests - but it has not reduced drug use in America.

Albert Einstein once said that the definition of insanity was doing the same thing over and over again but expecting different results. Before committing to continue a costly strategy that has failed to produce desired results, President Obama and Congress should conduct a thorough review of our efforts over the last 40 years, seek out the best practices of all nations and develop a more effective international strategy to reduce drug use. If our strategy does not change we should not expect a better result. Please send me your thoughts to
