Minutes of the September 2008 HPNA General Meeting.


The September 8, 2008 HPNA Meeting was called to order at 7 p.m. by President Elaine Meenehan.

The first item on the agenda was a report from the Development Review Committee (DRC) about the 4213 Avenue G, Bradford-Norha House. The owners have requested a demolition permit for the house. The DRC has done additional research to support the historic importance of this house to the neighborhood. Hannah Wiseman and Mary Caroline George presented photographs and information supporting the historic zoning. Among the criteria that the Bradford-Norha House meets are the following: Over 50 years old; retains the integrity of mate-

At the Fire Station Festival on October 26, HPNA President Elaine Meenehan will bring to a close two years of dedicated, inspired and inspiring leadership when she hands over the presidential reins to David Conner. As she prepares to do so, we think it appropriate to take a moment to reflect on the many positive and noteworthy things that have occurred during her tenure. The list of highlights would include, though by no means be limited to:

- a Preservation Award from the Austin Heritage Society, celebrating Thad Avery's restoration efforts at 42nd and Guadalupe;
- launching of the ongoing Local Historic District initiative;
- stalwart neighbors bonding together in a limited partnership to save and restore the Schenken-Oatman House at 311 W. 41st;
- also on 41st, Grande Communication's sponsorship of a highly successful HPNA fundraiser at Nick and Linda Van Bavel's beautifully restored home;
- the "It's My Park!" Day Shipe Park cleanup attracting scores of volunteers, and joining the likes of the above-mentioned Festival, the annual Christmas/Holiday Party, and the Homes Tour as an annual highlight on the HPNA calendar;
- saving of lots of old trees all over the 'hood, and planting of lots of new trees at Shipe;
- after years of "Alley Cats" volunteer efforts, the City's assumption of responsibility for ongoing maintenance of Hyde Park's alleys;
- approval and funding of a Comprehensive Restoration Plan for the Ney Museum;

- Hyde Park's continued designation as "Best Neighborhood" in the *Austin Chronicle's* annual "Best of Austin" awards;
- and perhaps most importantly, the emergence and engagement of a new generation of leadership for the Association.

Of course, Elaine can't and wouldn't take individual credit for all of these accomplishments and plaudits. But what she CAN take credit for is managing to personify and nurture the kind of spirit that made them possible — a spirit that was captured quite nicely in her column on "The Meaning(s) of Community" in our October '07 issue: "To be a member of the community, we have to start by being part of the community... We'll either live together, or die alone."

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

rials and design; has characteristics of a recognized style and type of architecture; has association with significant person(s) -- specifically, Dewey Bradford, who was a friend of Lyndon Baines Johnson and other politicians, and who served on the Texas Fine Arts Commission. The report emphasized that demolition would change the character of the area. Long-time neighbors and noted architectural historians Peter Maxson and W. Eugene George also worked on the research for this report.

Next on the agenda was a report from the **Nominating Committee** made by Chairman Alan Marburger. Other committee members were Grant Thomas, Catherine Moore, Michelle Paris-White, and Elaine Meenehan. The following is the slate of officers nominated by the committee:

The next item on the agenda was a presentation by **Officer A.J. Rodriquez, Hyde Park's area representative for the Austin Police Department**. Officer Rodriquez gave an update on criminal activity in the area and steps being taken to deal with such activity. He mentioned that there were increased patrols in the area, including bicycle patrols. He emphasized the importance of reporting suspicious activities as well as crimes. Rodriquez said the next Commander's Forum would be September 16 at McCallum High School from 6:30-8:30 p.m.

Carol Welder, who serves as HPNA's Crime and Safety Chair in Hyde Park, encouraged people to sign up to be a block captain in the **Neighborhood Watch Program**. 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


Story of ... well, not exactly agreement

Over the past year the Historic District Design Guidelines Committee has been working together to complete the first draft. The effort has been educational and inspiring, but it has not been smooth. As we set off to bring the work we've done to our neighbors here in Hyde Park, we want to tell a brief story of how the guidelines came to be. It's not the typical story of a like-minded group of folks working together on a common cause. In fact, it's been more of the opposite.

The work began in 2007 when Michelle Paris-White (graciously and unwittingly) volunteered to head up the group and sent out a general call for interested parties. From the beginning, Michelle knew the group needed to have representatives from not only the historic preservation side of the story but from developers, architects, homeowners, and builders.

If I described our first few meetings as "argumentative" I would be generous. It was anything but a meeting of like minds, and it took us about three meetings to figure out what on earth it was that brought us all together in the first place. Through our "discussions" we came to understand that we each cared deeply for our neighborhood, and that we all


did not want any more houses to be torn down.* That was it. In terms of historic styles, sustainable design, or design ingenuity, we all brought different ideas. That small core of an idea, "prevent tear-downs", became our mantra. As we created the guidelines and fought along the way, we always returned to that one point.

What evolved through these meetings was a set of design guidelines that worked within and not above the existing design guidelines for the neighborhood. Our group was most fortunate to follow after years of initial work had been put together. Our goal has been to create a series of guidelines that derives from that work and that carries the minimum amount of restriction to maintain the physical and spatial integrity of our neighborhood while at the same time providing a legal framework that will make it nearly impossible to tear down an existing structure.*

We realize that good design cannot be dictated by any law or any set of guidelines and that often such efforts can have the opposite effect of creating derivative faux-history. Here in Hyde Park we have rich history; we want that history to continue to inform us and to continue to grow, both in story and in the form of the buildings and neighborhood.

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Hyde Park is planning a *Walk though the Avenues* in support of America's Night Out Against Crime. **The 25th Annual National Night Out**, a unique crime/drug prevention event sponsored by the National Association of Town Watch, has been scheduled in Austin for **Tuesday**, **October 7**, **2008**. Mark your calendars now. **Neighbors who want to participate in the Walk should report to Shipe Park at 6:30 pm. After visiting with each other and hearing from APD crime prevention representatives**, off we'll go for a **communal stroll – be sure to bring flashlights**!

Last year's National Night Out campaign involved citizens, law enforcement agencies, civic groups, businesses, neighborhood organizations and local officials from over 10,000 communities from all 50 states, U.S. territories, Canadian cities and military bases worldwide.

National Night Out is designed to heighten crime and drug prevention awareness; generate support for, and participation in, local anticrime programs; strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships; and send a message to criminals letting them know that neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

Along with the traditional display of outdoor lights and front porch vigils, cities, towns and neighborhoods *celebrate* NNO with a variety of events such as block parties, cookouts, visits from police and sheriff departments, flashlight walks and youth programs. NNO has proven to be an effective, inexpensive and enjoyable way to promote getting to know your neighbors better.

Hyde Park's Neighborhood Watch will have a meeting in September with block captains and APD to discuss a recent assault/rape, *eggings* of people, cars and property, and what we can do to assist the police in capturing these criminals. We will also discuss National Night Out activities planned for the neighborhood. If you would like to know more about the Neighborhood Watch Program, please contact me at <cjwelder@msn.com>. Since inception, over one year ago, we have more than 45 block captains who have helped to raise awareness of crime and its prevention. 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

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Saving the Century-Old Bradford-Nohra House

at Avenue G & 43rd Street

The Austin City Council will consider historic zoning for the century-old Bradford-Nohra house at 4213 Avenue G on the October 16 agenda as of press time. The case will come before the City Council after extensive consideration by both the Historic Landmark Commission and the Planning Commission as required by Austin's 3-step decision-making process.

The case was set in motion when an application for demolition of the house was made by Sylvia Dudley, Trustee for her mother, Mrs. Helen Nohra, owner and resident of the house since the 1940s. Austin's ordinances require the review of all demolition requests for property located in a National Register district -- in this case, the Hyde Park National Register of Historic Places District. Although no plans have been presented to the city government, Mrs. Nohra's family has stated their plans to build duplexes on the property after demolition. On July 28, the City of Austin's Historic Landmark Commission recommended historic zoning for the house by a unanimous vote of 7-0.

Consideration of the case then passed to the City of Austin's Planning Commission, which on September 9 also recommended historic zoning for 4213 Avenue G by a vote of 7-1 with Commissioner Clint Small dissenting.

When the Historic Landmark Commission staff reported their lack of success in finding sufficient information about the original structure or the Bradford family, a team of Hyde Park residents, led by lawyer Hannah Wiseman and architectural historian Mary Carolyn George, pitched in and gathered abundant materials. The house was occupied by the Bradford family – civic, cultural and business leaders in Austin for many decades, with Dewey Bradford its best-known and most colorful member. Dewey Bradford was art advisor to President Lyndon Johnson and his wife, Lady Bird Johnson, spanning his vice presidency as well as their years in the White House. Both as owner of the Country Store Art Gallery and the Bradford Paint Company, Dewey nurtured the careers of many artists, including and notably Porfirio Salinas, who painted Texas and southwestern subjects. Bradford was appointed to the first Texas Fine Arts Commission. His earlier accomplishments included

Mary Carolyn and her husband, architect Gene George, provided architectural analysis of the last remaining Neo-Classical house in Hyde Park. The HPNA's Development Review Commission distributed packets containing this information to the Landmark and Planning Commission staff and commissioners and made presentations at each commission meeting.
