

Quick updates on some some items discussed in previous issues:

On August 3rd and 18th there were pretrial hearings in the tire slasher suspect's trial. The trial in the case was set for August 22nd. We plan to give an update on it at the general meeting in September.

On August 15th the Austin Parks Foundation account agreement between HPNA, Hancock NA, North University NA and the Austin Parks Foundation was finalized, so I am hopeful we will have everything lined up so we can move forward on our effort to beautify the city-owned land at 3801 Duval through the city's neighborhood partnership program by the time the weather is once more hospitable to planting things.

You can also check the Keep Bruning Avenue Open Facebook page.

The Friends of Shipe Park are continuing work on the mosaic mural on the poolhouse wall. Updates on that and the pools are periodically being posted on the Friends of Shipe Park Facebook page.

Finally, let's welcome the Griffin School to its new home in Hyde Park! In August it moved into its new location, the former location of Trinity United Methodist Church.

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

#### Fire Ant Awareness


The second week of September is Fire Ant ▲ Awareness Week. While there hasn't been a lot of fire ant activity lately due to weather, be aware that they will be back.

When it's hot and dry outside, people may have fire ant activity and get stung but not see mounds to treat. Under hot and dry conditions, fire ants dig deep into the soil to find cooler temperatures and to be closer to the water table. Fire ant mounds often return after rainfall or with regular irrigation.

When temperatures are at the sweltering range, it's a good idea to bait for fire ants since the mounds may not be seen. Fire ants will still be out to forage for food and will pick up bait as a food and take it back to the colony to share with others. It is best to bait in the early morning or evening when temperatures are cooler.

Make sure that bait is fresh- it should have a nutty smell- and that it does not get wet from rainfall or irrigation. Read the label for the proper application rate and use the correct application equipment. Also, consider sharing some bait with your neighbors so their fire ants don't move into your yard.

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
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
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## **Ball Moss and Your Trees**

So, you notice that your trees have a heavy growth of ball moss on the lower branches, and these branches seem to be dead or dying. It's not a bit unreasonable to conclude that there is an insidious attack on your trees by hairy gray blobs - they are killing your trees! You would not be alone: many people have come to this same conclusion. However, there is a lot more to the story. The truth may be less dramatic, but it could allay some of your fears. Read on for some facts that shed more light on what's going on.

Ball moss (Tillandsia recurvata), is a flowering plant in the pineapple family (bromeliads) - many of which, like ball moss, are epiphytes. Epiphytes live on trees but are not parasites; in fact sometimes ball moss can be seen growing on concrete bridges and electric power lines - objects not alive and thus not providing nourishment, merely physical support. Ball moss is happiest in relatively low-light, somewhat humid habitats - places such as found on the lower branches of trees. Wispy appendages on ball moss seeds allow them to stick most readily to rough surfaces such as bark on branches but a little less likely to smoother surfaces (like bridges, power lines, and even smooth-barked crepe myrtle).

Most trees around here do well in high-light environments, but their lower branches are not tolerant of low-light levels. In fact, lower branches frequently die off as a result of insufficient light - even in the absence of ball moss. So, the environment that

favors ball moss is the one that is not favorable to tree branches. Voila! Ball moss found growing on dead and dying branches.

There's more. I sometimes encounter the claim that ball moss is "suffocating" the trees. Hmm. While it is true that, like most multicellular organisms, plants need oxygen, they produce their own oxygen during photosynthesis. They actually make more than they need, hence the atmosphere is packed with their waste oxygen.

Not only do ball moss growths not extract nutrients from their hosts, they have not been shown to produce any chemical that harms trees. [However, interestingly, they have recently found some chemicals extracted from ball moss that induce tumor cells to kill themselves as well as to have some anti-AIDS effects. But these effects would likely have no effect on host trees, inasmuch as the bark is dead tissue.]

There is the claim that ball moss takes mineral nutrients that would otherwise go to the tree, and this is true to a limited extent. However - again - this seems an unlikely problem for a couple of reasons: the biomass of ball moss is generally small compared to that of the tree, and when the ball moss dies, its nutrients end up in the tree, anyway. In fact there is speculation that ball moss helps trees recycle their own nutrients faster by causing the lower, dying branches to fall off sooner, and thus adding to the tree's nutrient supply.

I am aware of only one study showing an actual deleterious effect of ball moss on host trees. This occurs when young trees are found in somewhat reduced light conditions where the ball moss can grow in a way that blocks light from young shoots even then this has a fairly minor effect. And, it does not apply to Hyde Park trees that live in an abundant light environment - this summer even more abundant than usual. Several other careful studies have shown no harmful effects of ball moss on their hosts.

It's up to you whether to worry about ball moss on your trees. But, if you do have it removed, do it for esthetic reasons and not because of any harm to the trees. As for me, I like seeing ball moss on trees.

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
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
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#### Letter from the (New!) Editor



- · Chinese elementary for children over 4
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

#### PROPOSED AMENDMENT

#### XI. STEERING COMMITTEE

The Steering Committee shall be the principal representative, governing, and policy-recommending body of HPNA. Actions of the Steering Committee shall be governed by the will of the membership as expressed at general and special membership meetings.

The Steering Committee shall be comprised of the officers of HPNA, the immediate past president of HPNA and 6 current voting members of HPNA who are elected at large for a 2-year term. These 6 positions will be staggered so that 3 positions are filled each year at the same time officers are elected. There is no term limit on how long a single person can hold this position. A revised list of the members of the Steering Committee will be listed in the *Pecan Press*, web site, and email list each year.

The voting members elected at large may be reelected; however, a voting member elected at large shall
not serve in excess of two consecutive full two-year
terms. The two consecutive two-year term limitation for
voting members elected at large shall not prevent the
election of such persons from further service as a voting member of the steering committee after an absence
from that committee for two or more years. Serving
more than one year of a two-year term is treated as a full
two-year term for the purposes of term limitation. Serving one year or less of a two-year term is not a full
two-year term for the purposes of term limitation.

In the event that the Steering Committee position of the immediate past president of HPNA is vacant, an additional member shall serve on the Steering Committee in the place of the immediate past president. If the position is vacant at the regular time for the election of officers, it shall be filled in accordance with the terms of these bylaws for the election of officers. If the vacancy occurs during a term, it shall be filled by a candidate nominated by the Nominations Committee upon a vote of the Steering Committee.

The President shall serve as chairperson of the Steering Committee. The Steering Committee shall meet at least at a standing time and day to be determined annually by the Steering Committee. Notice shall be given by e-mail or telephone to all Steering Committee members.

The Steering Committee meetings are open to the all members of HPNA; however, only Steering Committee members can vote on issues.

The Steering Committee can appoint any ad hoc committee or positions such as chairs. All appointments shall be announced to the next meeting of the general membership, as well as on the official announcement email list and in the *Pecan Press*.

## **HPNA General Meeting Minutes for August 1, 2011**

Hyde Park's Baker School and its fate provided the basis for much of the August meeting's agenda. About twenty neighbors listened to a presentation from Nicole Colley-Abram, chief financial officer for AISD, and Paul Turner, chief of facilities, who presented an overview of challenges facing the district that led to the current proposal to sell Baker, as well as the Carruth Administrative Center (CAC) downtown.

President Lisa Harris called the meeting to order at 7:05 PM.

Ms. Colley-Abram said the proposals to sell CAC and Baker were originally proposed several years ago by a consultant studying resource usage in the district. The recommendations were made purely as a business case and did not take any political factors into consideration, including neighborhood support. District administration is coming up with a proposal to bring before the school board in September, with an eye toward action at the November meeting. Any decision about campuses, including Baker, will be made at the board level, and the board is the proper place to make neighbors' views known. (N.B.: Neighbors are already organizing to speak about the Baker School issue at the September trustees' meeting.)

**Trinity UMC** office administrator Amy Duncan then informed neighbors about a new program sponsored by Trinity, **Kids for Peace**. The first event will be the Great Kindness Challenge on Saturday, August 13th, when participants will make treats and share them with the crew at Fire Station 9, assemble lunches for the homeless, and perhaps do a neighborhood walk and trash pickup.

Adam Wilson reported on the status of **Shipe Pool** for 2012. It appears that at this point, closing Shipe and other neighborhood pools has been taken off the table. Currently, the city is proposing instead to close Dick Nichols and Balcones pools for the winter months. We have asked for city to put together a working group with citizen input to think about the longer-term issues of aging infrastructure and budget constraints, which will continue to come up. PARD is contracting for an independent organization to provide an assessment of their resources. We hope HPNA will be part of the framing of the questions in that study.
