

# From the Desk of the President.

The City of Austin is proceeding towards phase two of its HOME zoning ordinance, with one of the intended goals being to incentivize property owners and developers to build more private housing close to downtown.

The city's proposed changes to the Land Development Code would affect how your property or properties near you may be developed or used in the future. A few weeks ago, you should have received a lavender postcard from the city providing notification of the proposed zoning changes. According to that notice, the proposed changes would do the following:

• Revise regulations that apply to lots with one housing unit and regulations that apply to flag lots.

- Create regulations that allow properties to be used for charging electric vehicles.
- Revise height, building placement, and other related regulations that are in addition to a property's base zoning regulations (also known as *compatibility standards*).

By the time you read this letter, the city will have held two open houses and two public hearings on the new proposed zoning changes. The City Council meets on May 16, 2024 at 10:00 am to vote on the new zoning ordinance. For more information from the city about its plans, please visit *SpeakUpAustin. org/LDCupdates.* At that site you will learn how to register to speak at the relevant city meetings, submit a written protest, and provide feedback.

Some of you also may have heard from the group Community not Commodity (CNC), which has stated that City Council's proposed actions will reduce compatibility

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in more than 1,000 properties in new, high-density transit districts. "Compatibility" is a zoning term that refers to the height, scale, mass, and bulk of structures relative to other structures. CNC argues that the City Council's proposed new compatibility standards would allow buildings as tall as 10 stories next to single family homes in some areas of the city. CNC is also concerned that the Council's amendments to the Land Development Code will end single-family zoning throughout Austin and cause property taxes to rise higher. # Letter to Austin Mayor and City Council

*Editor's Note: At the upcoming General Membership meeting, the membership will have the opportunity to discuss, amend, and vote on the following letter.* 

#### Dear Mayor Watson and City Council:

Having spent the last half century caring for the historic Hyde Park neighborhood, the Hyde Park Neighborhood Association (HPNA) is disturbed to see that the City of Austin intends to allow an additional 60' of height on all sites currently zoned multi-family and/or commercial in the Hyde Park Neighborhood Conservation Combining Districts (NCCDs). After decades of work, funds, and collaboration between neighborhood volunteers and the City of Austin, this proposed action is completely contrary to the purposes of an NCCD as well as to the processes that were required to achieve this level of thoughtful planning. Throughout its history, HPNA has entertained new developments in specific locations and supported many changes, but this broad-brush approach to undermine all Hyde Park planning is inappropriate.

Despite decades of notices, meetings, and collaboration with property owners, HPNA has not heard anything from the city about this intent to remove conservation provisions that will clearly modify this livable neighborhood. Our concern is that speculators will choose sites of their liking and place inappropriate new development alongside homes and other compatible neighborhood uses. This is all to be approved by the City Council in May with only minimal public hearings. This is not collaborative planning, which has been the standard practice in Hyde Park for decades. We ask that the city begin anew with a process of participation with our neighborhood to discuss the need for this approach and what the city is expecting. It is only fair to hundreds of residents and property owners to be open about this massive change rather than dropping it a few weeks before implementation. This certainly is not the way HPNA has worked with residents and city staff in the past.

HPNA is ready and willing to provide notice, meeting space, and additional information to our neighbors if only city officials who have crafted these proposals will agree to provide their time and assistance for appropriate discussion.

Thank you for your consideration.


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# Around & About the Avenues



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Lettuce Recycle! by Dena Houston Celebration Begin!

y first edition of "Lettuce Recycle" was in March of 2016. I wrote it for our neighborhood newsletter. Today, it appears in





Hvde Park's Pecan Press. Allandale and Brentwood newsletters, and in Stroll magazine. My goal is recycling and composting education. I am very blessed to have this opportunity

to share this information with my Austin community.

#### **Recycling Updates**

- Aerosol cans These cans go into the blue recycling bin if they are *completely empty*. Cans that have anything in them are fire hazards at the recycling facility. Cans that are not completely empty go to the Recycle & Reuse Drop-Off Center or into the trash can.
- Black Plastic Optical scanning has been upgraded at Balcones Resources so that black plastic with a recycling symbol can now be recycled. This is the facility that receives recyclables north of Lady Bird Lake.

#### "Buy Nothing" Personal Story

I was recently faced with a recycling challenge. We had lots of lumber we needed to get rid of. None of it could be reused because it was rotten or very well used. My only option seemed to be the landfill. THEN, on Buy Nothing a posting suddenly appeared from a member who needed any kind of lumber to fill her raised garden bed before top filling with dirt. She was

our landfill savior. She filled the back of her SUV with all the used lumber. Nothing went to the landfill; all went to her garden to grow lovely plants.

# The Most Important Things I Want My Readers to Know about Recycling and Composting

- Balcones Resources and Texas Disposal Systems are the two companies that collect and recycle materials for the City of Austin. They have reliable markets for these materials. There were two very challenging times for these companies. The first was when China stopped accepting the world's contaminated recycling materials. The second was during Covid, when some of the markets had to shut down. Both Balcones Resources and Texas Disposal Systems anticipated these situations and planned ahead so that they could continue to have strong markets.
- Recycling can be confusing. Markets change and there are no rules governing the recycling labeling of products. Some products (like toothpaste tubes) are marked as recyclable but they are not recyclable in our markets. These items go into the trash cans.
- The City of Austin's composting facility is Organics by Gosh. It is completely organic; it uses only time, water, and heat to compost – no chemicals. This is why it is so important to use only BPI certified plastic bags and containers to avoid compost contamination.
- We should all try the best we can to recycle and compost properly, but it should also be convenient and easy to do. It might seem counterintuitive but, when in doubt, please throw it out. Do this rather than contaminating the recycling and composting streams. I am available as a resource for any questions or concerns.
- I get many questions relating to articles declaring that all recycling picked up ends up in the land-fill. There are also people who say plastics picked up for recycling all go to the landfill. *None of this is true about recycling in Austin*. All items picked up for recyclables are pulled out and sent to the landfill. Everything else is sold to recyclers around the country. The main thing to know is that recycling is a for-profit business. Sending items to the landfill does not produce income.

#### **Most Asked Questions**

Every week, I get recycling and composting questions. I always answer them personally and often include the questions and answers in a future newsletter.

Following are the most frequently asked questions:

• *Why can't I bag my recyclables?* Never bag your recyclables. The recycling facility is not set up to open these bags. These bags end up going to the landfill.

- What do I do with lids from plastic and glass bottles? All glass bottles and jars need to have their lids removed. All plastic jars and bottles need to have their lids and caps left on. Any lid that is removed and is smaller than a credit card must go into the trash can.
- *Why can't pizza boxes go into the blue recycling bin?* Even if a pizza box looks clean, it has absorbed grease that is not visible. This grease makes the cardboard unable to be processed properly for recycling. All pizza boxes can go into the green curbside compost collection bin or the trash can.
- Do plastic containers have to have a recycling symbol? Plastic bottles and containers must have a recycling symbol to be recycled. If they do not, the items go into the trash can.
- *How do I recycle shredded paper*? Shredded paper cannot go into your blue recycling bin, even if it is in a paper bag. These bags tend to come apart and leave a mess of shredded paper in their wake. Please put shredded paper into your green compost cart. Be sure it is in a paper bag or compostable bag. Please do not include shredded plastic credit cards.

#### **Please Remember:**

- Do Not Bag Recyclables
- When in Doubt, Throw it Out! Recycling and composting contamination is a huge problem. If you have exhausted all reuse possibilities and are still unsure, put the item into the trash can.
- Nothing Smaller than a Credit Card in the Blue Bin.

# HPNA General Meeting Minutes: April 1, 2024

Kevin Heyburn opened the meeting at 7:05 pm. Kevin announced that Council Member Zo Quadri was unable to attend the meeting as scheduled due to a family emergency and that he will reschedule for a future meeting.

Kevin then introduced Mary Ellen Lewis from Helping Hand Home. She shared that Helping Hand Home is a 101 year old organization, founded in Austin and operating in Hyde Park on Avenue B. They are a home of healing and restoration for children who have experienced trauma and have a clinical team to provide counseling services. They provide residential care for children ages 4 through 13 and facilitate adoptions for children ages 0 to 18. They also facilitate and train foster parents. Mary Ellen shared a video highlighting the story of a couple who have gone through the Helping Hand Home training process and happily adopted five children.

Following Mary's presentation, Kevin introduced Stephen Gonzales and thanked him for his significant role in organizing the HPNA Bunny Parade, which benefited Hope Food Pantry. Stephen shared that the event surpassed what was raised last year and presented a \$2440 donation to Stephanie Humphreys with Hope Food Pantry. Stephanie provided more information on Hope Food Pantry, whose mission is to alleviate hunger in the Austin community with healthy food options. Last year they served over 500 households experiencing food insecurity. She



acknowledged many of the Hyde Park neighbors who are active in the organization and thanked HPNA for the food and fund drives that help boost their inventory.

Kevin thanked the presenters from the organizations and noted their importance to Hyde Park and to the city of Austin. He then introduced Andy Jones, HPNA's new Crime & Safety Chair. Andy has lived in Hyde Park for over 30 years and has been attending the Community Police Academy since January, so he is able to get details on local crime directly from the Austin Police Department. He provided an update on crime statistics so far this year and is able to be reached for any additional questions or reports through his contact information in the *Pecan Press*.

Lisa Harris and David Connor presented an update on HPNA's graffiti abatement work. This group of volunteers gets together every second or third Saturday of the month to remove graffiti on public property without damaging surfaces or paint. Any graffiti unable to be removed safely is reported to the city through the 311 app. While it is difficult to prevent graffiti from happening, quick removal is one of the best deterrents. Anyone wishing to get involved can reach out to Lisa Harris through her email address in the *Pecan Press*. Volunteers should bring their own gloves. All other supplies are provided.

Brendan Wittstruck, who chairs the North Central I-35 Neighborhood Coalition, provided an update on Austin's I-35 expansion project. TXDOT is moving forward with widening I-35 to 20 lanes and preconstruction work has begun. The project is expected to officially start in late spring or early summer, and the Hyde Park area will experience the majority of construction between 2026 and 2032. Brendan will continue to be a conduit between neighborhood associations and their council members. He emphasized the importance of community engagement to influence the project and mitigate impacts to neighborhoods, particularly as the cap and stitch program is developed and as decisions are made regarding raising Airport Boulevard along the I-35 intersection. TXDOT and the City of Austin will be conducting a public engagement process for community input on how the project is implemented. Brendan will provide more information on these public engagement sessions as they are scheduled.

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Following Brendan's update, Kevin shared that HPNA is celebrating its 50th anniversary this year. The neighborhood association was founded in 1974 with the impetus to save Hyde Park's Fire Station #9. HPNA welcomes ideas for creative ways to celebrate this anniversary and to continue building our neighborhood community.

Kevin concluded the meeting with announcements:

- Chris Wooster shared that the Waymo autonomous vehicle company has been testing in Hyde Park for the last ten years and is entering a new phase of testing the use of these vehicles as taxis. Waymo approached HPNA to get input from neighbors prior to this next stage and will hold a remote meeting April 11 to present information and answer questions.
- Kevin updated attendees on the Nuts & Bolts Open House for the city's new Equity-Based Preservation Plan. He talked to some organizers at the event and would like to have them speak to us, along with other historic districts, in an upcoming General Meeting. The Equity-Based Preservation Plan is still in progress and presents an opportunity to preserve housing while meeting the city's desire to build more housing.
- Susan Moffat noted the recent city mailer regarding HOME Phase 2 and the apparent disconnect between staff statements and the draft ordinance regarding impervious cover increase. This does not appear to consider the flooding risks or impacts. Susan also noted the city's delay in

implementing the detention pond behind the Baker School, which has been on hold since Project Connect was scaled back to terminate at 38th Street. The HOME Phase 2 mailer has information on dates for public hearings and the project appears to be moving quickly.

- Kevin reminded HPNA of the Travis County election on May 4 for the Central Appraisal District Board of Directors. This was also noted in his recent President's Letter on important issues as this will have a significant impact on tax appraisals and how the tax appraisal district is run.
- Brendan recognized Susan and the press from KUT on commemorating the history of the *Austin Chronicle* building, one of the many casualties of the I-35 expansion.

Kevin adjourned the meeting at 8:18 pm.

On March 29, KUT reporter Olivia Aldridge reported that owners of the Austin Chronicle building, Hyde Parkers Nick Barbaro and Susan Moffat, opened a time capsule buried in the building in 1999 ("Austin Chronicle opens time capsule before I-35 edges out historic building"). Opening the time capsule was a last hurrah for current and former employees before the building is demolished as part of the expansion of I-35. Susan expressed her regret at the loss of the building and stated, ""When we were buying it, the inspector came and said the foundation was such that you could put a 30-story structure on top of it, and in the event of nuclear war, this was where he was coming.
